The Church's Job is to Be the Church

Sometimes it's hard for me not to worry about the future of the Christian church in the west. We are by turns fragmented, compromising, conflicted, and, increasingly, on the outside looking in at a culture that seems to have lost its spiritual bearings and doesn't want to find them again.

I had a chance to think about this with other Christians a couple of weeks ago. I travelled to St. Catharine's, Canada, on behalf of the Anglican Church in North America to take part in a dialogue about these issues with the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, and the Lutheran Church of Canada.

A couple of things stood out to me from these conversations. The first is simply that we are not alone, and there is something about this great moment of cultural transition that has pushed those of us who confess Christ as Lord closer together than before. That is a good thing.

Secondly, our job is the same as it has always been. While it is tempting to get caught up in trends and politics and times and seasons, "the Church's job is to be the church." That doesn't change, even though cultures shift. We are called to worship. We are called to evangelize. We are called to serve our neighbors in Jesus' name. We will do these things "in season and out of season" (2. Timothy 4.2) at Epiphany.

That said, there are also some challenges, ones we need to take seriously as a church and as individuals.

First, those of us who are parents need to realize that if we don't very purposely raise our children to be Christians, the culture won't

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do it for us. In fact, the culture we are in will do the opposite, stripping away any beliefs our kids may have occasionally seen us model and replacing them with the spirit of the age. At Epiphany, we want to help you with this, through our Christ-centered Sunday school program, and opportunities to worship and serve as a family. Prioritize these things. Bring your children to church on Sunday. Show them by your actions that being a Christian and being part of the Christian community is more important than other alternatives.

Secondly, in a world where Christianity is not as "respectable" a way of looking at the world as it once was, we all need to invest in understanding why we believe what we believe. This is not just for us to feel better about our beliefs, it also helps us do what 1st Peter calls us to in chapter 3, verse 15: "Always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect." We are prioritizing in-depth teaching at Epiphany, through our Wednesday night classes (the next one is coming up in January) and through our recently completed parish weekend to help us all with this. Attend these as you are able.

Finally, friends, don't worry too much. God remains in control of times and seasons, and that includes our time and our season.

What's Your Story?



Recently I heard a long-time Christian say that his testimony (the story of how he became a Christian) was "boring". What he meant was that he had not had a dramatic conversion story—he had not had a radical transformation from a life of rebellion against God to a life lived for God. He knows that he is a Christian, but he somehow felt that his story was "boring" because it did not contain the kind of incredible, almost instantaneous transformation that some others have experienced.

My story is much like his. I was raised in a Christian family. I committed my life to Jesus as a child, and by God's grace he has never let me go. I have certainly had my doubts, struggles, fears, and trials, but I have never turned away from God because of them. And I too felt that my story was "boring...that is until I was in college.

I remember that at one point in college it suddenly dawned on me: I wish EVERYONE had that kind of "boring" story. I wish everyone grew up in a home where faith in Christ was passed down from generation to generation. I wish that no one knew the despair of the prodigal son (Luke 15) who had rejected and run away from the Father. I wish no one needed the kind of radical transformation from a life lived opposed to God, but thanks be to God that he does seek after us even when we have openly rejected him and need that kind of radical transformation.

I began to realize that, in fact, the "boring" story of those faithful saints who have far surpassed me in their faithfulness to Jesus even from their childhood is deeply encouraging to me. One need not have been actively involved in hideous sins to have a story worth telling. Honestly, the story that excites me is of the teenager who knew Jesus personally and followed him in high school even when that meant she was left out because she refused to drink with her friends. I am encouraged and moved by the story of the athletic boy who graduated college without sleeping around despite what that meant for his popularity among "the guys". I love hearing stories of how Jesus has turned people's lives around in radical ways as well, but I would much prefer everyone to have a story of life-long faithfulness to Jesus.

Then I had a son, and suddenly this new realization hit home for me as it never has before. I want more than anything for my son to know Jesus, to love Jesus, and to follow him wholeheartedly all the days of his life. Suddenly, the story of one who trusts in Jesus as a child and walks with him for one's whole life doesn't sound boring at all. I pray every day that my son will never need to experience the radical transformation from a life without God to one submitted to him.

So, what's your story? If you have been radically transformed from a life opposed to God, stop and thank Him. If you have, by God's mercy and grace, been spared from the need for such a radical transformation, stop and thank Him.

MISSIONS

This month, we have two reports from organizations which Epiphany supports. The first if from Andy Fetzer with Young Life in Southwest Virginia. The second from Global Scholars. - Gordon Coffee

Young Life: This summer close to 200 Roanoke teenagers experienced the Best Week of Their Lives at Rockbridge. Kids will remember the smallest details from those days and nights at Rockbridge for the rest of their lives. I still remember the first time I went to Young Life camp 24 years ago. I remember sharing a bunk with Brian Mehm in Windjammer 1A, waking up early to barefoot water ski with JD Gibbs, the Jello-O fight in the gym with Billy Edmunds, the "planned" spaghetti dinner fight on night four with John Colston, climbing Mt Ampersand with Brian Gorg... I could write a book from all the memories forged that week. The thing about what we remember most has to do with friends experiencing those things with us. And when we get to a place where we hear for the first time how much God really loves us, I mean, really really loves us, where he's crazy about us, so much so that God shows us by sending Jesus to die for us and we hear that with our friends? Man, that's good stuff. It doesn't get any better than that! And in Young Life, we get to be there all year long sharing the truth of how much God loves our friends. Here's to a new school year and a lifetime of memories forged with dear friends.

Global Scholars: We are close to each of our students, and they relate to us as parents. At the beginning or end of each meeting with a student I usually have prayer with them, which they appreciate. [My wife] usually joins us, and we often discuss personal growth issues and troubling issues in their lives. The students very much appreciate this 'parental guidance' and prayer for them, and are often very open about their issues.

One of the issues we've dealt with this year has been how the violence in Southern Sudan has had such a personal and tragic effect on our six students from there. Kim (not married, of the Dinka tribe) went back to Malakal to rescue his family, and managed to get them out of the house just in time, though his uncle was killed behind him as they ran. Back in Juba (the capital) he exited a house moments before the room he had been sleeping in was blown apart. Susan, visiting her husband in Juba, looked out to view a commotion and ducked back in as

bullets whizzed past her head. Later that day everyone in that room was [killed] by a machine gun thrust through the window.

Though we didn't end up working in Southern Sudan as we had hoped earlier, our contribution to that nation is probably greater now from here in Uganda, where these students can study more effectively and safely."

A. How would you describe your relationship with God and how have you come to this point in your spiritual journey.

I'm a work in progress. I was baptized when I was five months old, and confirmed when I was twelve. My family participated actively in



church and it was an integral part of our lives. During college and grad school my participation became less active, and as a young adult, very infrequent. During this time I continued to believe, but knew that something was missing from my life. I believed, and prayed, but wasn't in a real, personal relationship with Jesus, or other Christians, outside my family.

Participating in the 40 Days of Purpose program at Epiphany a number of years ago began to give me some insight into what our lives are really about; re-reading "The Purpose-Driven Life" a second time the message reached me at a far more personal level. Like all of us, I have benefited from a number of Epiphany ministries, especially our Sunday worship, including its music, the Adult Education program, and the many wonderful opportunities for fellowship, both formal and informal, that exist in the Parish. I also was glad that Epiphany has caring people that participate in the Prayer Line to turn to when a close friend's teenage granddaughter was given less than 48 hours to live by her doctors. She's now considering whether to take a 'gap' year after graduating from college next spring.

Thankfully, my Lord and Savior has been patient with me. Even when I wasn't attending church regularly, I did have an active prayer life, although not surprisingly, it tended to focus on me, my needs and deficiencies. I am still in the process of learning that it's a vital necessity to pray for the needs of others, not only family and friends, but those that I have had difficulties dealing with. I'm also learning that it's fine to ask for things that we need, but it's necessary to know that what will get done is His will, and that everything will occur in His time. I usually begin the day with Bible reading and prayer.

B. Describe your history with the Churtch pf the Epiphany, including how long you have been attending, what ministries you are or have been involved in.

I began attending Epiphany in the fall of 1995. I have participated in Ushering, the Stand-in-the-Gap prayer ministry, the Hypothermia ministry, as well as several Bible studies in the Adult Education program. I served on the Vestry during 2010-2012, both as a member and as the Junior Warden for the final year, and have served on the Personnel Committee for the last several years.

C. What are your hope and dreams for the Church of the Epiphany?

That we can achieve what our vision statement calls for: To stand for Jesus Christ; to grow together as God's family; and to make Him known through the power of the Holy Spirit, in an environment where all are welcome, and will be able to learn about and accept the great gift that we have been offered, to fulfill our purpose.



I also hope that we are able to open our hearts to do the work that we have been given to do, particularly with respect to our current location. Most of all, I hope that Epiphany will continue to emphasize, and practice, covering everything with prayer.

Finally, I would like to participate in the building up of new/additional leaders in our congregation so that the work we have been called to do will continue as long as we look to do His will.

D. How will your life experience and abilities contribute to our leadership?

As reflected in the question about my spiritual journey, I believe that I can relate to people that are also still finding their way to, or back to, God. While not specifically areas of ministry, I have communication and business skills that could be put to use for Epiphany.

A. How would you describe your relationship with God and how have you come to this point in your spiritual journey.



I would sum up my relationship with God in the word "Sovereign". I have come to understand that my worldly efforts are inconsequential and often destructive without the spiritual guidance from, and the submission to God's will. I've experienced enough in my life to have seen firsthand that "victories" in life that were of my own will and not under the authority of God do not satisfy, and often lead to other problems. On the other hand I've seen again and again that no matter how far down the path I might be with a personal effort, once its turned over to the authority of God and the redeeming power of the cross, God has faithfully brought it to a conclusion that is beneficial to the glory of his kingdom. This is true in work, ministry and family relationships as well.

B. Describe your history with the Churtch pf the Epiphany, including how long you have been attending, what ministries you are or have been involved in.

Tracy and I began attending in 1997 a year after moving into Oak Hill. In that time we have grown spiritually from searching children, then to worshiping adolescents, and now (hopefully) to maturing servants in Christ. I say maturing because I cannot wait to see how God will transform us as individuals and as a married couple in the coming years. I know that one does not "arrive" spiritually in this fallen world, and I look for Christ to mold us into his image on a daily basis. Personally I've tried to serve the Church with the gifts I believe I have. I began with joining the Epiphany Players and worked in the Drama ministry and continue to do that. In 2003 I heard my first calling to the Vestry and was blessed to be elected where I served two years as the Building and Grounds lead, and then a year as the Vestry representative to the Finance committee. These were three of the most significant years of spiritual growth in my life. Since that time I was called to spend time with my wife and children and actively pursued coaching and other bonding activities with my kids as well as working on having a deeper relationship with Tracy. I've participated in various volunteer roles during this time.

C. What are your hope and dreams for the Church of the Epiphany?

My dream for the Church of the Epiphany is that we stay centered on Christ, and offer ourselves and our journey as a congregation to the glory of God. I am confident that God has a special purpose for this Church, for this congregation, and for our clergy, and if we stand together in Christ without fear, we will have the special privilege of seeing God's will revealed in our efforts. As we moved through the separation from the Episcopal Church and the loss of our building, I've been asked many times whether I believe we made the right decision. My true feelings on this are that I don't really think it matters at this point. While I believe we acted in faith as God led us, spending time worrying about such matters is not really the point now. What is important is that we are here now with all of our collective

experiences and God can and will redeem our faith in Him to His glory.... And I can't wait to be a part of it. I believe the God led us to where we are and we are in a unique place in time and location to be a wonderful instrument of God's will. I believe God wants us to take his message to the local community we live in, to places in the world He would lead us to, and especially to our own lives and our own families as God's desire for us is to live in joy in communion with Him in our lives.

D. How will your life experience and abilities contribute to our leadership?

I believe the best things I bring to this ministry are my Christian walk and my health issues. I spent most of the first 30 years of my life in fear that God would undo the plans I had for my life and spent much of that time making alternative plans. I'm not sure how much is from spiritual maturity, or how much is emotional fatigue, but letting go of my own ideas of what I thought a successful life looks like and trying to walk under the authority and guidance of Christ was the beginning of a successful life. I'm not suggesting we just go with the flow without discerning, planning and executing on efforts, but how much more fulfilling they are if one has in mind that His will be done at the end of that process, and not ours. As for my health.... Those who know me know that I've struggled with some health issues in my life. After 37 years on that walk, I am at a place of the most peace I've ever had related to that. I'm not saying that I don't get scared or frightened, I do. One thing is fairly clear to me and that is that I'm quite stubborn. I believe that trait got me through some tough times earlier in my life. That trait is limiting though and can only get you so far on your own strength. Accepting that I cannot fix things on my own strength and trusting that God will walk with you and strengthen you through tough times, especially by providing support and strength though his Church is a life lesson for me that was hard taught, but well worth learning....

A. How would you describe your relationship with God and how have you come to this point in your spiritual journey.

Jesus Christ is a very real presence in my life. I can't picture what my life would be like without His presence. I have this deep abiding



awareness of God's great love. This love transcends everything. I have a positive outlook on life because I know that God is much greater than any problems I am facing. I find God's Word to be a constant reminder of who He is and who I am. When I was a young boy I was impressed by the faith of my grandfather. I saw him as a man of good character who put his trust in God. My mother would sometimes take me to Sunday school. We didn't go very often. I remember one Sunday morning when I was content to be at home and read the Sunday comics, I think I was 8 or 9 years old, and mom said we were going to church. I didn't want to go. I didn't like only going once or twice a month. I didn't feel like I belonged. God must have had His hand on me because I said "I want to go every week or I don't want to go at all." We went every week. This was the beginning of my walk with God. Ever since then I have been actively connected to a church every place I have lived. I was blessed to receive sound biblical teaching from god-fearing men and women. I was active in the youth program. I taught 5th grade boys Sunday school class. What a way to grow. During the year one of the boys was killed in an accident. This left a mark on all of us. Since then I have been blessed with many opportunities to serve in the church: teaching, singing, leading a college and career ministry, leading bible studies and small groups, serving on the Vestry, participating in prayer mninistry, and most recently chairing the Finance Committee at Epiphany. Throughout my life God has been my certain and sure friend and guide. I know that God brought Jan and me together. Over the years God has been our constant companion. He is the glue that overcomes our differences. We share a common faith. While we don't always like the same things our values are alike and we complement each other. I am sure that this is God at work in our lives.

B. Describe your history with the Churtch pf the Epiphany, including how long you have been attending, what ministries you are or have been involved in.

Jan and I began attending Epiphany around 1987, while Epiphany was meeting at Franklin Intermediate School. At first we just attended the Sunday Service. 



A. How would you describe your relationship with God and how have you come to this point in your spiritual journey.

My relationship with God is an endless work in progress that has grown very slowly throughout my life. It has been a journey of many seasons,



The journey that brought me to this point is a long one so I will try to condense it as much as possible and focus on the most important part.

I always knew that God was watching over me, but it took forty years and some shock and awe before I realized I needed to ask Jesus into my life. The "shock" part came when we lived in Kodiak, Alaska. I had not attended church for several years and began to miss Christian fellowship and connection to a church, so I visited a small Episcopal Church one Sunday. During the service a very heavy snow began to fall and when I left to go home the snow had already covered the roads. As I got into the car, a sudden frightening feeling came over me that I was going to die. I tried to dismiss it, thinking I was just nervous about driving on icy roads, but the feeling persisted and I became petrified to the point of tears as I wondered if I would have an accident on the way home and never see my family again. I prayed, reminding God that I had a family that needed me and that it would break my heart if my girls had to grow up without a mother. I pleaded for God to protect me and to help get me home. Finally, after several minutes had passed, I was calm and gathered enough courage to drive home, arriving safely. But my mind was spinning wondering what that was all about...was God trying to tell me something? We had received new orders to Panama City, Florida, and I surmised that maybe God was telling me to find a church and get involved, so I promised God right then that I would start searching for a church to join as soon as we got settled in Florida.

The "awe" part came several months after joining St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Florida. I had become active with the choir, VBS and other activities, and had nearly forgotten the incident in Alaska. At St. Andrews, I finally realized there was much more to church than just occupying a place in the pew. I was blessed by the friendship of two very dear women who discipled me and prayed with me as I received Jesus into my life.

Then I was encouraged to attend a "Life in the Spirit" seminar where I received The Holy Spirit by the laying on of hands. That is when my journey with Jesus began. It was a very awesome moment, and one I remember vividly because I had a vision and the vision changes as I grow through the stages of my spiritual journey.



However, the real "awe" came one Sunday after church, when I was in the church's bookstore looking at some pendants in the showcase. There was one that had an unusual design that I didn't understand, so I asked the clerk what it meant. She said "it represents dying to self". I instantly felt like I had been struck by a bolt of lightning as I realized that was the message God was warning me about in Alaska when I had the strange feeling I was going to die. It was not a physical death, but one of surrendering my life to God, trusting Him and not leaning on my own understanding. I will gladly admit that I still have moments where I charge ahead and do things my way, forgetting to consult with God, but as I said...I'm a work in progress.

I joined the Church of The Epiphany in the eighties when it was still a mission church, meeting at Franklin Intermediate School. I continue to be a member to this day.

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Choral Evensong

Please join the Choir and Clergy for Choral Evensong on November 2nd, 2014 at 7:00pm.

Evening Prayer is a liturgy that is used in the Anglican tradition and celebrated in the late afternoon or evening. When the office is rendered chorally it is known at Evensong. Evensong is one of the oldest traditions of the Church. Prayer and Praise is the essence of this service. The Choir will be ministering the works of Peter August Schnecker who came to America in 1865. He became the Assistant Organist at St. Thomas Church New York, and later became the MusicDirector at West Presbyterian Church in New York.

- 2) **In-House** where people come to the church to pray. Parishioners sign up for 20 minute slots (or more). Monitors are there for the entire vigil if held on site. Booklets or guides are provided.

Starting Nov. 2, More Prayers for Your Prayer Requests




