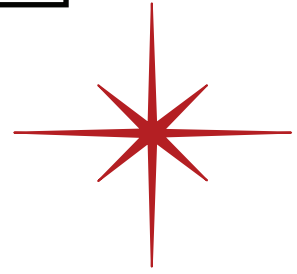

An Epiphany “Christmas Gift” to our Neighborhood Christmas Eve Offering to Purchase 900 Books for Coates Kids



One of the things that has been clear to me over my last five years at Epiphany is that we are a church that has been both blessed with great resources, and that wants to be generous with what God has given us.

With that in mind, I’m excited to announce an opportunity to do that this Christmas Eve, when we will work together to purchase almost 900 beginning English books for Coates elementary school in order to help our local kids become better readers. This is a real challenge in our area, where there are many new immigrants who don’t know, but would like to learn, English, and many, many children (according to Fairfax County Public Schools, a full 45 percent of the student population at Coates) who only have limited command of the English language.

While purchasing a small library of books (and some requested English teaching aids for teachers at Coates) might sound like a lot, it’s actually a manageable project for Epiphany. Individual books that meet this need at about \$4 each. The vestry has agreed to set aside the offering, up to the approximately \$4,200 needed, from both Christmas Eves services for this project.

To be part of this chance to serve a real need of our neighborhood in Jesus’ name, just give your financial gift on Christmas Eve, and divide by it four if you’re interested in knowing how many books your donation will purchase. This would also be a great project to do with our children. Our plan is to have sample books of the kind we will be purchasing available to see at church in the weeks leading up to Christmas.

A team from Epiphany led by Jan Coffee, Barbara Noble and some of teachers who are members of our congregation, will then buy the books, using sources recommended by the library team at Coates. We will bless them, and deliver them to the school in January.

I’m excited to see us have an opportunity as a church to give what will be a significant gift to the students and teachers at Coates Elementary School. Our goal as a church, and my goal as your

Christmas Services At Epiphany

This year, we will be celebrating the Christmas Season at Epiphany beginning on Sunday, Dec. 20 with Lessons and Carols, and then continuing with two services on Christmas Eve.

Lessons and Carols is a musical service at 10am on Sunday, December 20. This traditional service combines readings from scripture with well known Christmas carols that we sing together as a congregation. This year, Lessons and Carols will include a short sermon focused on the meaning of Christmas. While Communion is not part of the Lessons and Carols service, there will be an 8am Holy Eucharist on Dec. 20.

Christmas Eve Worship at Epiphany this year will be at 5 and 11 pm. Our 5pm service includes an interactive children's sermon. The 11pm service is a traditional candlelight service with the adult choir and chime choir.

"All are welcome at Epiphany. We are looking forward to a great Christmas Eve celebration this Wednesday," said the Rev. Peter Frank, Epiphany's rector.

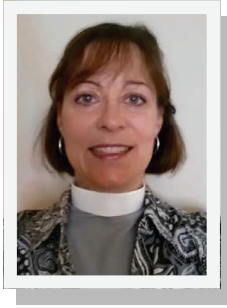


Evangalism Idea of the Month!

Church Vitality



November was a fantastic month, most notably because our whole diocese came together for teaching and training during Synod. It was so exciting to see more than 100 people from all over the diocese crammed into the room for a 3-hour teaching on Evangelism. The next day during Synod our Canon for Church Multiplication, the Rev. Dr. Tom Herrick, encouraged us to consider what kind of plumb line or score card we use when we assess the vitality of our churches. He gave examples:

- what percentage of the congregation can articulate the vision;
- what percentage of the congregation is active in the whole life of the church;
- what is our ethnic mix;
- what percentage of the budget is allocated for ministry and for maintenance;
- how many of our ministries are externally or missionally focused;
- how many church plants or new ministries have we launched in the year;
- how many first and second time visitors do we have?

Tom used a helpful analogy. While it is still important to “take an x-ray” of the church, we live in a time that we have the option of going deeper and taking an “MRI” in addition. Because thinking missionally is the way I am wired, I was so encouraged by these talks and would welcome anyone who wants to explore further.

Missions Update SAT-7



In recent months, the press has marveled at the propaganda war being waged by ISIS, which uses Twitter feeds, chat rooms, and slick videos of violence and purported testimonials to promote its "Caliphate." Epiphany is proud to support SAT-7, which provides a Christian retort to ISIS, minus the depravity. SAT-7 operates TV stations and an internet site to promote Christianity in North Africa, the Middle East, and Iran. SAT-7's three channels, SAT-7 ARABIC, SAT-7 PARS and SAT-7 KIDS, can be seen in every country from Morocco to Afghanistan. Arabic, Farsi and Turkish speakers living in European countries can also view the broadcasts. Here are some comments from listeners:

Man from Algeria: "I do not know how to start or how to empty my heart before you. I am unable to express my admiration for your channel. The more I view SAT-7, the more I am amazed by its programs. They have cost me many sleepless nights wondering whether I am on the wrong track or not."

Woman from Syria: "We are about 140 families and we live in a remote area of Syria in Middle East where there are no churches yet. SAT-7 programs are like medicine to our sickness."

Man from Tunisia: "Thanks to your inspirational programs, the Holy Spirit has filled my heart and cleansed it from sin. Now I know why the Christian faith is so special. It is because the Lord Jesus is always with me and He will never leave me. I have shared my faith with my friends and they have come to the same conclusion as me. So, we have started to follow the Lord Jesus Christ and recently we celebrated Easter together. I kindly request you to send me a complete Bible because I only have a small portion of it. Please send it as it will strengthen our hearts and increase our faith."

Man from Afghanistan: I am writing to let us know that I enjoy all of the new SAT-7 PARS programs. I'm particularly impressed with the series on the History of Christianity in Central Eurasia. I found many of the segments to be wonderful. How can I buy a copy of that series for my own?"

Painting the Saints

Icons painted by Epiphany members on display during Advent

For years, Epiphany members have been quietly painting a particularly type of religious image, called an icon, under the direction of Elizabeth Hudgins, who attends the 8am service. This Advent season, approximately a dozen examples of their work will be displayed in the sanctuary at Epiphany.

“Christians don’t worship icons, but these pictures, painted in a style that has changed little for more than 1,000 years, serve both to tell us Gospel stories, and to remind us of the lives of followers of God who have gone before us.” said the Rev. Peter Frank. Epiphany’s rector.

The word “icon” comes directly from the Greek. It means “image,” Eastern Orthodox churches employed the word to describe paintings of the Christian saints and Jesus done in a particular style. Icons are meant to preach the biblical truths and are considered by the Orthodox to be equal to a priest's preaching the Word, except in colors. Iconography has specific rules, dictated by biblical truth. So, for example, the light is not external: it comes from within the Saint. The colors start with the shadows and are revealed as holy by the addition of light and more light...to make a saint.

Icons do not look realistic in terms of our world because once Christ has come into the world, everything is made new...so rocks, animals, plants, and people do not look like the everyday things we see with our earthly eyes. For example, saints are much taller than the proportions we are used to seeing, and they are serene (except at a death of someone) because they have the peace that passes understanding and, thus, are not tossed to and fro by the earthly occurrences around them. In addition, perspective is reversed so that we become the vanishing point because God is within the Saint, looking at us. So saints are windows through which we can learn of God.

If you would like to know more about icons and the reasons for the specific details of pose and layout, please feel free to take one of the DVD sets available in the library. In two separate lectures with a number of photos of icons, you will learn how to "read" an icon. You will also see why they are trans-temporal, why borders are often pierced, why no icon is shown as happening inside a building, why various saints are pictured as they are, and how to always recognize Jesus in an icon. The DVDs are free, and if you wish to keep one or get another to pass on, please do. If, however, you are finished and would like to return it, we would appreciate that. In addition, you may contact Elizabeth Hudgins with any further questions or insights. She is listed in the directory. You also might want to talk to any of the students whose works are shown here.
