



INTRODUCTION

Two thousand years ago in Israel, the man who is God incarnate, Jesus of Nazareth, led his followers into a life-giving relationship with himself and his divine Father, and was executed for being a revolutionary. Risen from the dead, he charged his followers to make disciples throughout the whole world, promising that he would be with them and equipping them for their mission with his Holy Spirit. The New Testament presents the essential witness and teaching of Jesus' first emissaries, the Apostles, who proclaimed his truth with his authority. The faith of Christians today, as in every age, is shaped and defined by this apostolic account of Jesus Christ.

Within a century of Jesus' earthly ministry, Christian congregations could be found from Spain to Persia, and from North Africa to Britain. By this time, the *catechumenate* for would-be Christians (from the Greek *katecheo*: "to instruct" – a period of 1-3 years' instruction leading to baptism at Easter) had become established Christian practice. This pattern of Christian disciple-making continued for some centuries before falling into disuse, as nominal Christianity increasingly became a universal aspect of Western culture.

Praying for a Son



For about a week now, a father has been coming around 11 am every day to pray in our chapel at Epiphany. He is visiting his son in the United States on a two-month tourist visa. Though communication has been a bit of an adventure, it's clear his son is very sick, and he is very worried for him.

The communication barrier being what it is, I don't really know beyond a general region of the world where this father is from. I can't pronounce his name. I don't know if he is a Christian. I don't really understand what is

wrong with his son. I have no idea how he found us and where he found the courage to walk into a church in a strange country looking for a place to pray.

But, he is here. I see this father's faith every day in our chapel.

I have to say I am impressed, and challenged. This father is, whether he knows it our not, taking Jesus' parable in Luke 18 seriously. You probably remember the story. Jesus says we "ought always to pray and not lose heart" (18.1). He then tells the story of a widow who constantly and consistently demands vindication from a judge, and ultimately receives it simply because she refuses to go away. Jesus says God listens to us when we pray even better than that. "And will not God vindicate his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will vindicate them speedily" (18.7-8).

There are things in my life I have been praying about for a long time. Sometimes I get discouraged because I haven't seen God answer those prayers in the way that I would like. Maybe you have experienced the same thing in your life.

If you have felt this, it's time to pick yourself up, dust yourself off, and get back on your knees before God. Come to church and pray here if it helps, we're open for this kind of thing.

We cannot force God to do what we want. But we can ask. In fact, Luke 18 encourages us to ask, again and again. We "ought always pray and not lose heart." Are we willing to do it? Are we willing to take God as seriously as the father who has been visiting Epiphany every morning for the last week to pray for his son?

Laity and Clergy from all over the US and Canada as well as many international guests from places like Nigeria, Kenya, Uganda, South East Asia, and Australia gathered for worship, prayer, fellowship, and mutual encouragement as we focused on moving the ACNA out in its God-given mission of "Reaching North"

America with the transforming love of Jesus Christ."

I came away from Provincial Assembly so excited for the mission of the church! I love the fact that the ACNA has stated in its Constitution that the Provincial Assembly will always be essentially a missions conference. Of course, there is business that needs to be done, but the main focus of the massive gathering of leaders from all over North America is always on the mission of the church and advancing God's kingdom. The overwhelming emphasis on mission (evangelism and discipleship) makes me proud to be part of the ACNA. This is a branch of the church that I am thrilled to be a small part of.

At the Assembly, we had the opportunity to hear regularly about what God is doing in and through the Anglican Church in North America as well as around the world. We heard from Archbishop Kwashi from Nigeria about the way God is advancing his kingdom there. We heard from numerous church planters around the US and Canada about what God is doing through the work of church planting. We were encouraged by Gary Haugen, the founder of the International Justice Mission (IJM), to be churches that refuse to stay safe but rather "get in trouble" by standing with those in trouble. We heard from J.I. Packer who challenged the church to take seriously our need to adequately disciple and train our members.

FINANCIAL REPORT

FISCAL YEAR 2014 (JULY 1, 2013 – JUNE 30, 2014)

Summary

This was a challenging fiscal year. Income from offerings and gifts was much less than the year before, particularly during the fall of 2013. The budget was reduced twice to reduce expenses. These reductions, coupled with stronger giving from the congregation in the second half of the fiscal year, enabled us to end the fiscal year in a sound financial position.

The annual stewardship campaign for FY2014 was completed in the late Spring of 2013. We received 96 pledges totaling \$733,994. Based on historical patterns the pledges received would support an operating budget of about \$900,000. However, giving for the prior year (FY2013)

was \$1,014, 849. Therefore, based on expertise and recent giving, the Vestry approved a budget of \$1,003,823.

By the end of September the Vestry concluded that giving was not sufficient to support the approved budget and in October voted to reduce the budget to \$975,192. As giving continued to lag in October and November, a further reduction was made in January to \$945,192. A significant part of this reduction was not replacing the executive assistant to the rector, Anne Bracy, when she retired.

On the positive side, a tremendous end-of-year giving in December substantially eliminated much of the deficit accumulated through November. And with the reduced budget, the giving for the last half of the year covered monthly expenses.

The final result was a minor deficit of \$4396 (less than 0.5% of the budget)

ACTUAL EXPENDITURES VERSUS BUDGET

The following table contains the original budget, the reduced budgets and actual expenditures.

The October Budget included <u>an increase</u> of \$23,600 in Personnel due to a much larger than expected increase in rates for staff Medical Insurance. The original budget assumed an 11% increase; the actual increase was 19%. Substantial reductions were made by: eliminating almost all Vestry projects, eliminating all but \$1,000 in Reserve, and reducing Worship, Outreach, Discipleship, Congregation Care and Church Operations. The result was an October budget reduction of \$28,681.

By December it was determined that additional reduction of \$30,000 was necessary to ensure Epiphany's financial soundness. The second reduction was implemented in January. The January Budget included minor increases in Church Operations and Finance and Legal to reflect known expenditures. The large reduction in Personnel was due to the decision to eliminate the Executive Assistant to Rector position.

As can be seen in the final results, the budget reductions were effective and brought overall spending in line with income for the remainder of the fiscal year.

EXPLANATIONS

These are the major reasons for variance of expenditures from the January Budget for each category.

WORSHIP

The net cost for altar flowers was less than anticipated because more costs were paid for by parishioner payments than anticipated.

Music expenses were less because some costs were offset by special contributions. Funds budgeted for praise band were not needed.

OUTREACH

Mission trips were funded by special gifts and budgeted funds were not required. Expenses for Hot Meals were less than budgeted.

DISCIPLESHIP

Youth and Children's expenses were less than anticipated. Nursery expenses were lower than anticipated. These were accomplished by finding low cost ways to run these programs.

CONGREGATION CARE

Benevolence Funds for emergency financial assistance were not needed

CHURCH OPERATIONS

Advertising and Copying expenses were higher than expected.

VESTRY

Money designated for special Vestry initiatives was not used.

FINANCE & LEGAL

Legal fees for negotiations regarding parking were larger than expected. Steps have been taken to reduce ongoing legal costs.

As of June 30, 2014 Epiphany has cash on hand of \$223,259.87. While Epiphany reserves the right to use all donations where needed, it is customary to honor donations for specific ministries. A record is maintained of all designated gifts and the uses of such funds. As of June 30, 2014 Epiphany held \$33,315.63 in restricted funds, \$19,641.64 for various ministries and \$13,673.99 in building funds. Current Liabilities were \$155.66.

The 2015 budget includes salaries for Rector and Assistant Rector and salary increase for staff. Beginning September 1st staff will pay 5% of medical healthcare insurance costs. In the past Epiphany has paid 100% of these costs. The budget also includes setting aside \$2000 per month for future relocation when the lease expires.

A budget of \$903, 769 is conservative. Total giving in 2014 was \$922,029. During our Spring campaign we received 103 pledges. The total Pledged was \$836,548.

Historically giving at Epiphany has exceeded pledges by about 20% (1.2 times pledges). Our 2015 Budget is 1.08 times pledges.

To Be a Christian: An Anglican Catechism


The Anglican Church in North America is pleased to announce the release of To Be a Christian: An Anglican Catechism produced by the provincial Catechesis Task force.

Led by the Rev. Dr J.I. Packer, the Task Force has developed a unique and powerful resource for helping inquirers come to an understanding of the Christian faith, and for helping disciples deepen their relationship with God. Written in a "Question and Answer" format, this Catechism, in the words of Packer, "is designed as a resource manual for the renewal of Anglican catechetical practice. It presents the essential building blocks of classic catechetical instruction: the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments (the Decalogue). To these is added an initial section especially intended for those with no prior knowledge of the Gospel; as such, this catechism attempts to be a missional means by which God may bring about both conversion to Christ and formation in Christ."

The Most Reverend Robert Duncan, Archbishop of the Anglican Church in North America, noted the global impact of this work: "This Catechism assumes a post-Christian world where the basic foundations of the faith cannot simply be assumed. It begins by outlining the faith

for those who have no Christian background, or were never fully discipled. This production is a landmark offering, both for North Americans and for the whole Anglican world. Our Christian brothers and sisters from other provinces who saw advanced copies have enthusiastically begun translating the Catechism into their native languages. So far we know of translation work in Spanish, Mandarin, Farsi, and Urdu. We are excited to see this work expand in the days ahead."

The Catechism is available for purchase from Amazon. It is now available here for non-commercial use in PDF and Microsoft Word format.

BACKPACKS AGAIN! Please help make it happen

The collected backpacks must be delivered to the school by the **DEADLINE**, Monday August 18th.

Hints from the County program coordinator for middle school needs are listed below:

- Backpacks of 18-19 inches or larger with at least 2 zippered compartments.
- Unisex colors and patterns preferable.
- Some places to purchase the backpacks are as follows...be on the lookout for sales!

 - o Target and Kohls usually have good prices as well.
 - o You can also check out Amazon.com or Overstock.com.
 - o And don't forget the great Walmart!

Epiphany has been there to help school children in need through this program for many years now. I am confident that God will help us find a way to be there for them again this year.

If you don't have the time to shop, you can either give a check to me or to Janice Monaghan, or put one in the collection plate on Sundays, payable to Church of the Epiphany and marked "for backpacks". I will gladly do the shopping for you and all your contributions are tax deductible.
