In Defense of a Long Christmas

As is the case for many families, Christmas while I was growing up really started around Thanksgiving. To be exact, we started the day after Thanksgiving, when we would put on our boots (or our skis if there was snow on the ground) and go find a Christmas tree in the woods behind our house. My parents' old Christmas records (and eventually new cds) would go on the stereo in our living room while we decorated that tree, and stay on until Dec. 26, Boxing Day.

When I became an Anglican, I learned that technically speaking, we were doing it all wrong. Advent comes before Christmas, and then Christmas continues for 12 days, all the way from Dec. 25 to Epiphany on January 6.

Well, I have a confession to make. When it comes to keeping Christmas, I am kind of a lousy Anglican. Yes. I keep the 12 days of Christmas now, but I probably start listening to Christmas (not Advent) music sometime in the middle of November. To add insult to injury, we never make it much past the first week of December before we get a Christmas tree. Now, that said, we also light the Advent candles every night and do family devotions together. But there is no getting around the fact I rush the calendar a bit.

There are good reasons not to do that (Mtr. Pamela actually writes about that very thing in this issue of the Star. You should read her column). But at the same time, there is something wonderful about stretching out instead of reigning in our celebration of Jesus' birth. We live in a world that often can feel like (to steal from C.S. Lewis' Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe) "It is always winter and never Christmas." It is a good thing, I think, for us to turn the tables for a few weeks every year, to make Christmas and our celebration of the hope it brings long and luxurious.

Friends, however and whenever we celebrate this season, let's make it long. Let's take time to savor the good news of our salvation, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2.11).

Thanksgiving for God's provision



It's that time of year again where it is hard to be Anglican and have traditional leanings when it comes to the celebration of the seasons.

Consumer realities are pressing Christmas more and more into our *Autumn* Season. It is not winter yet for another month but you wouldn't know that, based on Christmas decorations popping up all over the place. But my main point of frustration is not from the Christmas decorations per se. Rather, it comes from the nostalgia I have for **celebrating a beautiful Thanksgiving** without Christmas secular

trappings. Thanksgiving, at this time of year (Canada celebrates in October) is a North American holiday that should not be eclipsed by the next season.

Why would an Anglican priest care so much about a holiday that only has a minor place on our religious calendar? See, Thanksgiving is more than a food or family event. Christmas celebrations share that feature. Thanksgiving stands out because it encourages us to recall, recount and rejoice in the things we should be thankful for.

First and foremost, we give thanks for the gracious provision of God.

We recognize that God is gracious to us whether we deserve it or not.

We remember that, although it is true that our paycheck made the food sitting on the table possible, ultimately we are grateful to the God who provides. Thanksgiving is a time we offer thanks, in a deeper way, for life itself and all the things we need for life: food being one of them. We are deeper and more grateful people because we recognize His sovereign goodness to his people. At Thanksgiving we also stop and reflect on God's provision of things that are not material, but nonetheless necessary for life.




One of the things that I think of is the gift of friendships in community. We cannot follow Christ apart from the family of God, His church. Folks who try to forge a faithful life of discipleship alone will invariably get tired and fall away. We were *made for relationships* with God and with each other. This is one reason that faithful and regular worship as well as Home Groups are so important. Paul says in Philippians; "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now," 1:3-5. The beauty of Thanksgiving is that we remember the tangible, physical things that make life rich, and the deeper relationships we need as well. Both are necessary. And I give thanks for relationships at Epiphany!

Epiphany Gets a New Website

In late November, Epiphany launched a major update to the church website: www.epiphanyanglican.net. These days, our website is our internet "front porch." Other than a personal invitation to church from a member, it's the most common way that people find Epiphany and make a decision to visit our church. One of the changes we made in this update was more tightly incorporate video and our livestream into our website.

Now, if you visit <u>www.epiphanyanglican.net</u> on a Sunday morning, the site prominently announces that our worship service is "live" and gives people a single click to get to the video feed. That means that instead of needing to explain how to find our livestream, we can simply tell people to go to <u>www.epiphanyanglican.net</u> on Sunday during worship. The new home page also automatically pulls in video recordings of our most recent sermons and makes those easy to see and view.

Loaves & Fishes Ministry

The Loaves and Fishes Ministry at the Church of the Epiphany began many years ago through the faithful work of Melanie Miller. She created a team and process to help ease the life circumstances of those who could use meals. Over time, there have been different coordinators, team members, and technology improvements. However, the gift of love and fellowship has been constant. As we read in 1 John 3:18 - Let us not love with words or speech, but with actions and in truth.

The current process begins with one of the Clergy, a Vestry member, or a Small Group Leader notifying coordinators of a need. Krystal Apelquist, lead and Carole Menzel, alternate, currently serve as coordinators. We contact the person who will be receiving the meals to learn more specifics about timeframe, dietary restrictions, etc. Sometimes meals are needed for a few days and other times it can be a week or more.

The Loaves and Fishes team members are ready to provide meals to those in our congregation experiencing a need, such as:

- 1) arrival of a child (or children)!
- 2) death in the family
- 3) injury, surgery or after a hospitalization
- 4) other times of need.



The schedule is then prepared using the online program "Take Them a Meal". The user-friendly website is full of information about recipes, cooking ideas, special diets, etc. Team members receive an automated e-mail from the "Take Them a Meal" website and then log on to select a day to provide a meal and indicate what meal they will bring. Usually, only a few team members need to sign up to fill each meal schedule. Many Loaves and Fishes team members usually provide the same dinner they serve in their homes so they are actually sharing a virtual meal with a church family member!

Adjustments can be made to the schedule at any time - extending the number of days, starting and stopping a schedule, changing the meal or team member. It's all very flexible. For example, if the recipient only wants the meal request to be sent to his or her Small Group or certain people, that's possible too!

Such a simple act of kindness can be a real blessing in someone's life. This ministry has been a blessing to our church family for many years - to both those who serve and those who receive! If you ever have a need for meals, please contact one of the Clergy, a Vestry Member, your Small Group Leader.

Ruth is the wife of Dr. Rev. John Senyonyi, Vice Chancellor (President) of Uganda Christian University. She has visited our Church several times as her husband has preached at Epiphany over the years. We are delighted that Dr. Senyonyi will once more be preaching at Epiphany on February 2nd, 2020.

Ruth is a pioneer in the sense in that she was the first professional counselor in her country. As she taught in high schools, Ruth knew firsthand the need for such help. When her husband was sent to the USA to seminary, by a miracle Ruth was able to work on her master's degree during that time.

When she returned to Uganda as John was finished in Seminary, she found people did not understand the term or what a counselor does. She was a great encourager and teacher to others to pursue counseling. Ruth created the Ugandan Counseling Association. She worked with seniors in high schools to help them understand risky behaviors that would get in the way of having a healthy, productive life. She worked in Rape crisis centers and trained others to be equipped to counsel victims.

Ruth realized she needed more training and by another miracle was able to go to graduate school, mostly on line and receive her Ph.D in Counselor Education from Regent University. Doing it online worked well with her responsibilities as mother and helpmate to her husband.

Ruth is the Provincial Mother's Union President, Church of the Province of Uganda. Mother's Union is a very important, large ministry supporting women in their roles as wife and mother. Through Mother's Union and in her various roles she speaks in different places in her country and was appointed to the GAFCON Task Force on Women. Ruth is Assistant Director/Counselling & Welfare, working with the employees and their families in the Bank of Uganda. She loves being wife, mother and now grandmother.

Ruth is a humble, faithful servant of the Lord and her country, Uganda. It will be a privilege to hear her story and share what the Lord leads her to talk about.

Epiphany's Christmas Gift - Biblical Trauma Healing


Trauma is part of the human experience in our broken world. We know all too well that trauma disrupts lives, destroys hope, perpetuates itself in cycles of violence, and perhaps worst of all, trauma isolates people from self, others, and from God. But there is good news: The Rev. Jay Baylor, an Anglican priest is teaming up with Maryland Bible Society, Somebody Cares Baltimore, and the American Bible Society to bring Biblical Trauma Healing (BTH) to Baltimore. He will receive the training and then train more facilitators and establish a community of care for ongoing support. The program has been adapted to serve the brokenhearted of America's towns and cities. And it works!! It works

to decrease trauma symptoms and increase connection to God. It engages the hurting with God's Word, and connects them to the local church. It helps answer the deepest cry of a wounded heart... "If God loves me, why am I suffering?" In a safe supportive group BTH helps people find healing that comes from forgiveness and connection with God. The initial cost to implement the training is \$25,000, which is just the seed money to complete the first year of training. At present, they have raised \$15,000 to begin this transformative healing program. Our goal is to devote the offering taken at Christmas Eve at both services to fund this much needed ministry in Baltimore.



Here at Epiphany we emphasize:

- Encountering God through beautiful worship and believing prayer
- Building a multigenerational congregation that loves children and families.
- Equipping every member to publicly proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.
