



Good Stewards and a Great God



In a few weeks, we will be beginning our annual stewardship campaign. When it comes to stewardship, Epiphany has a lot to celebrate over the last year. First and foremost, we have now paid the final bill to Atlantic Contracting for building our new facility!

When all was said and done, our contractor, Charlie, did a great job helping us keep our project expenses on budget. That's not to say there weren't some surprises along the way – there were. However, the build-out committee, our audio visual team, Charlie, and the “sweat-equity” of our congregation as we did things like paint together, meant at the end of the day, we have only needed to use \$4,117.30 of our unrestricted operating funds beyond what we raised through our “Journey of Joy” capital campaign to completely pay for all work that has been done to this point. The only outstanding item that it would be nice to have and hasn't been purchased yet is a large exterior sign. Given that our “all-in” cost for our relocation was over \$1.45 million, seeing final expenses and final income come within .3 percent of each other is nothing short of a miracle. That said, we have experienced a roughly 10 percent decline in regular giving as we held our capital campaign over the last year and that means our operating reserves are low right now.

I am convinced that we can continue to trust God with our finances. Epiphany's story over the last 32 years has always been a story of God's faithfulness, from the first service Epiphany ever held in the Franklin middle school cafeteria, to our first service here at Centerview Drive on March 11. To that I would add a maxim I heard a lot growing up as the son of a Christian camp director, “money follows ministry.” From our new work at Arbor Terrace to launching adult education classes on Sunday and some of our biggest Easter and Holy Week services in several years, ministry is growing at Epiphany.

All these things make this year's stewardship campaign particularly important. In a few weeks, expect to receive information about stewardship at Epiphany and about our financial plans for the year ahead, plus a pledge card in the mail. Pledges at Epiphany are between you and God (they are anonymous) but we do offer them as a congregation on Stewardship Sunday – which

will be April 29 this year. The finance committee uses the pledged giving number to make sure our budget for the year ahead is responsible.

Between now and then, please join me in giving thanks to God for the great generosity of his people here at Epiphany. God has done (and will do) great things.

As We Move: Adult Education Classes on Sunday Mornings

Starting the Sunday after Easter (April 8) and continuing through June, Epiphany will be offering a slate of Adult education classes in our new church facility. To allow for these classes, we are also changing the start time of our second Sunday morning service from 10am to 10:15. All classes will begin at 9:15am and conclude at 10:05.



Initial classes:

To Be A Christian: Team taught by David Meeks, Boyd Camak and Fr. Peter, this class will begin to walk through the Anglican Church in North America's "To Be a Christian" Catechism. The Catechism is built around the Ten Commandments, the Creed and the Lord's Prayer.

The Four Gospels: Elizabeth Hudgins will be offering a class comparing the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Elizabeth will also be teaching about just what a "gospel" is and isn't, and discussing why we ended up with the four Gospels we have.

The Holy Spirit: Murray and Ginger Black will be teaching this Exploration of the Holy Spirit. Their class will cover who He is, His presence in Scripture, and the importance of Him in our lives.

Fr. Peter on Sabbatical June-August

I will be taking a Sabbatical this Summer beginning on June 1 and continuing until the end of August. Epiphany clergy are eligible for a sabbatical after every seven-years of full-time ministry at the church.

During my absence, the wardens and Mtr. Pamela along with the vestry will have oversight over Epiphany. Two longtime friends of our church, the Rev. Robin Rauh, past rector of Epiphany, and the Rev. Bob Koth, will be assisting Mtr. Pamela and Deacon Dave by regularly preaching and leading Sunday worship.

I will begin his sabbatical by spending a few days in Athens, Greece (one of my favorite places) and then going on to serve as a conference staff member at the Global Anglican Future Conference in Jerusalem (www.gafcon.org) in June. This is an international meeting of orthodox Anglican archbishops, bishops and other leaders that takes place every few years. Hundreds of Anglican bishops and archbishops will be joined by more than 1,000 other Anglican clergy and lay leaders from around the world to build relationships and learn together in Jerusalem. As you may know, before I came to Epiphany, I was the Anglican Church in North America's first communications director. Part of my work leading up to that role was to be the North American communications lead for the first GAFCON conference that was also held in Jerusalem in 2008. Since I came to Epiphany, I have been happy to keep my focus on our local church and have set aside opportunities for national or international Anglican work. However, when our bishop asked me to come to GAFCON to support him as a volunteer staff member, and when I saw that the timing lined up with my sabbatical, it seemed it was time to serve our broader church in this way again.

After I return from Israel at the end of June, the Frank family will be driving to northern Minnesota, where I will be a part-time volunteer staff-member for July and August at Trout Lake Camps (www.troutlakecamps.org). While at Trout Lake, I also hope to take time to read, rest, and connect with my family (and extended family who live in the area) in the Northwoods.

While I am on sabbatical, my hope is to disconnect from email, social media and my cell phone. I will make sure the wardens and clergy know how to contact me in case of an emergency. I'm grateful for this opportunity to take a break and refocus after what has been an intense period of ministry at Epiphany. I hope and expect to come back in the fall ready for the next leg of our journey together.

Missions Update

*Here are excerpts from the recent report of **Fran Boyle**, who works with displaced youths in South Sudan:*

I recently returned from Kenya where I met with the Sudanese pastors that we support before they returned to their work in South Sudan. I was also there on a mission to find a high school for Longar.

Most of my time was spent trying to locate a boarding school for Longar that both of us felt comfortable with. After many hours running up and down the roads between schools, the Lord clearly led us to a school that we were both very happy with. The school was founded as and is still considered a Christian School, but it is run as a government school.

Longar shared all of the details of his trip into South Sudan which he had made shortly after he graduated eighth grade in Kenya. Longar spent time in Juba with two older married sisters and a younger sister that he had not seen since he was five. Longar is now sixteen. For some time, none of them even knew if the other still existed. Longar was abandoned at five when his mother was killed.

Longar also made a trip up to Marial Bai where I had found him. It was all surreal to him. He met relatives and found that as the only son in the family, he actually owns a piece of land in Marial Bai. Longar was able to ask a lot of questions about what had happened to him, what his mother was like, and even spoke with a brother of his mother. His married sisters were thrilled to see how Longar has been cared for and for the education that he has. They said that it was God who sent this woman to rescue you, only two months after our mother was killed. We are helping his younger sister go to school, but Longar wants to be able to help support all of them some day. He also wants to start a ministry to the street children that he sees in Nairobi. He sees that they are treated very badly. He says, "That once was me."

We graduated another eighth-grade class in Aquak Rak. The team from Answering the Call was there to witness the graduation ceremony. I am sorry to report that we are only able to send a few of the twenty students who graduated to high school for lack of funds. It costs only \$550 per student to pay for a year of tuition, food and housing.

The most exciting developments

was that the ATC team was able to purchase 25 cows for the orphanage! Our goal has been to gradually enable the compound to become more self-sufficient. We realize that becoming completely self-sufficient could take years, but this is a step in the right direction. The director, Santino, has drawn up a proposal which includes chickens and more cows. These cows and chickens will help supply the orphanage with milk and eggs and could bring in a little income to help cover other costs.

Another team from ATC is planning to go into Aquak Rak in May. Please pray for that team. The team serves the children when they go in and continue their outreach to the Darfurians.
