

Do Not Fear What They Fear



We live in a fearful, anxious time. One of the things that always seems to come with that are efforts to make sense of it all. That's a good thing. Knowing "what's going on" helps us make decisions and act in ways that help ourselves and each-other weather the storm.

That said, we must be wise in who we listen to and what we believe. There is a passage in Isaiah chapter 8 that seems to speak directly to the moment we are in. When Isaiah writes, it is a fearful time in Jerusalem. There are enemies outside the city, and unrest inside. People are wondering who is in charge, and

what is going on. Many assume it's a plot by shadowy figures to take control of the city.

Sound familiar?

In the middle of this situation, the Lord spoke to Isaiah. "For the Lord spoke thus to me with his strong hand upon me, and warned me not to walk in the way of this people, saying: Do not call conspiracy all that this people calls conspiracy, and do not fear what they fear, nor be in dread. But the Lord of hosts, him you shall honor as holy. Let him be your fear, and let him be your dread." (Isaiah 8.11-13).

Friends, we have a choice in fearful times. We can attempt to make sense of things ourselves. And there are a lot of people that would like to "help us" by presenting their theory on what is going on. Frankly and gently, the vast majority of those theories are wrong and some of them will actually do us harm. The earth really is round. Bill Gates is not trying to take over the world via a tiny microchip planted in a future COVID-19 vaccine. The UN is not controlled by lizard people from space (yes, that's a real theory that's out there).

Instead of listening to these attempts and others to "explain it all," by appealing to secret knowledge and shadowy forces, God calls us in Isaiah 8 to acknowledge that there are many things we don't know and can't control, but that He is in control. "But the Lord of hosts, him you shall honor as holy. Let him be your fear, and let him be your dread."

In short, what if instead of fearing conspiracies, we fear God? That is, what if we looked to him,

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instead of YouTube, or Facebook, or our favorite website to tell us what is going on? What if we trusted Him to show us our place in it, and what to do next?

Friends, God's hand is strong. He is not a conspiracy theory. He is a fact, and His hand is over us and over this time. Let's trust Him first and most – and keep everything else in perspective.

Spotting a Conspiracy Theory

We live in a time when it is hard to know who to trust. How do we sift out real information from things that are false? Here are some things we can look for:

- 1. **Secret knowledge required**: Conspiracy theories often promise "inside" details about otherwise public events. They claim to show us what is "really" going on.
- 2. **Anonymous Sources**: Many conspiracy theories rely on anonymous sources. If no-one is willing to publicly stand behind what is being said, be careful.
- 3. **New Interpretations**: Among Christians, conspiracy theories often claim to unearth previously unknown secrets in the Bible. Or to put it another way, they include a claim that they have found a truth in the Bible that everyone else has missed for almost 2,000 years.
- 4. **Making complex events simple:** The great attraction of conspiracy theories is that they take complex, or even random events, and build them into a system we can understand. That said, there are many things in life that are complex instead of black and white.
- **5. Assuming evil intent:** Conspiracy theories almost always assume that a shadowy group is attempting to secretly harm others in some way. Instead of allowing people to have convictions that differ from our own, it assumes people are acting for evil purposes against us, and they know it.
- 6. Persecution of truth-teller: In conspiracy theories, those that know the truth are almost always a persecuted and suppressed minority. Any attempts to question or challenge what the theory says are understood as an attack.

This said, events in the real world can have these traits as well. Some things are kept secret. There are evil people in the world. Whistleblowers do get suppressed from time to time. No one point above necessarily rules out something being true, but the more an idea aligns with these traits, the more careful we need to be before we give it our trust.

Knowing God



If you have been around the evangelical wing of Christianity, you would likely have heard of J.I. Packer and may have heard that he passed away last week, July 22. Although his most widely known book, <u>Knowing God</u>, was already 10 years old by the time I attended college, his work was popular among my Intervarsity peers and the book shaped my life. Inspired by this reading more than 30 years ago, I remember the decision I made to order my life around knowing God. This quote stands out: *"What makes life worthwhile is having a big enough objective, something which <u>catches our imagination</u> and <u>lays hold of our</u> <u>allegiance</u>, and this the Christian has in a way that no other person*

has. For what higher, more exalted, and more compelling goal can there be than to know God?"

And one thing I have learned from my pursuit of knowing God is how **very different** God is. When we set our expectations that God would act in a certain way because that is how other people act, we can come up surprised that God isn't like that at all. It bears reminding one another that God does not act like your typical leader of today. I ran across this from Beth Moore, which I edited.

God cannot be pressured. God cannot be lobbied. God cannot be bought. Nor can God be sold. God cannot be pushed out. God cannot be dragged in. God cannot be voted for or against. Nor can God be canceled. God is no one's team mascot. But when God is sought, He can be found.

Beth Moore has reminded us, as J.I. Packer had reminded us that God is transcendent. God's ability to transcend all of our everyday pettiness and our everyday worries puts God in a category all by Himself. Perhaps when we think about the "otherness" of God though, God can seem remote and unrelatable. We could worry that there is no overlap between our world and God's world. That's when we are brought up short and realize that God can still be found because God wants to be known. God wants us to seek. God wants our dedication to this pursuit, and I know that I am not alone in saying, "Knowing God is worth it!"


"Fear not, for I am with you, Be not dismayed, for I am your God, I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

2020-2021 Budget In Place

The Church of the Epiphany budget for fiscal year 2021 has been reviewed by the finance committee and approved by the Vestry. The budget process can be tedious and is rarely given the "fun" descriptor, but this past year has been a lesson in God's faithfulness to us and the budget reflects our optimism. There is more detailed information about the budget on this page, but the short version is that we are in a very good place as a church even as we go through this challenging season of ministry due to COVID 19.

This is possible for two reasons. First, it is possible because of the generosity of Epiphany as a church. So many people here give sacrificially to support ministry and mission. The biblical standard of giving is called a tithe (10 percent) of our income. Many at Epiphany do exactly that, and it enables us to do much as a church that is often difficult for congregations our size to support. Thank you!

Secondly, it's possible because we continue to see a great stewardship benefit from our move to 3863 Centerview Drive. Our current lease calls for a slight increase in rent and in the condo fees but along with that we get a free rent month in November. Additionally, as per the lease, we receive part of our security deposit back as a credit. The combination of these two benefits makes our building costs very manageable. In this coming fiscal year, we are planning to maintain our giving to missions at \$32,000. This brings our total mission and outreach giving to 9.1 percent of our entire budget. We are also able to offer staff a two and a half percent salary increase, and continue to rebuild our operating reserves which now stand at a little over \$180k.

It is true, we are in a difficult season. Still, God continues to bless Epiphany through your tithes and gifts. We are so grateful for your continued support of the church during this time of virtual worship and smaller in-person services. We will be holding our customary stewardship campaign in the fall to encourage us all to prayerfully commit to give.

Missions Update: Andy Fetzer

Here is a recent report from Andy Fetzer, our home-grown missionary, detailing recent events in his spiritual vineyard in Southwestern Virginia:

Dear Friends,

In this season, all our lives and jobs are feeling disrupted. But I'm keenly aware, especially in the past few weeks, that this disruption falls in a heavier way on some of our Young Life family. The daily news is bringing forward stories of racism, discrimination, and violence against marginalized people. As leaders in the community, we want to call attention to what we have seen in the world.

First, we lament it. Recent events haven't slowed down the Lord, but it also hasn't slowed down the enemy and the ripple effect of sin.

Second, I want those in our Young Life community who are feeling tired, overlooked, and marginalized to know that we see you. The scenes and signs of racial injustice are hurtful and troubling.

Third, I pray for Young Life in the Roanoke Valley, that we would look different from the world, because we are Kingdom citizens. If I were to sum up all the miracles of Jesus with one word, I'd use "RESTORATION." Jesus restores sight, health, self-worth, purpose, and life itself. May we each be people who catalyze that restorative work in kids' lives and in the culture we live in. I'm so thankful for all you do to help to move us forward in a challenging time. Your support and involvement allow Young Life leaders to be the hands and feet of Jesus to kids throughout our area (six feet apart, of course). I'd love to know how to pray for any of you or field any questions you might have, so feel free to reach out to us anytime.
