What's a Liturgy?



If you have been around church for a while, you have probably heard the way we worship called the "liturgy." As church-words go, it's probably one of the more obscure ones. In fact, I am not sure it is used by anyone else other than Christians (and not all of those) in English today.

But liturgy didn't actually start out as a church-word, or even a word connected with the details of worship in general. Instead (and this seems vaguely appropriate as April 15 approaches) it was part of the tax code! Originally, when the state assigned a major project to a wealthy citizen, something like outfitting a warship or producing a drama, it was called a

liturgy.

And here is the interesting thing. Being assigned a liturgy was both an honor and an obligation. On one hand, if you were assigned a liturgy, you had to do it. On the other hand, it was an honorable thing to do, because by completing it, you were serving your fellow citizens. For instance, we often know who took on the "liturgy" of presenting some of the more famous Greek dramas, because they were celebrated along with the authors of the plays themselves.

When we use the word liturgy these days, we aren't talking about building battleships or producing plays. At the same time, the sense that liturgy is both an honor and obligation continues. It really is an honor to be able to offer God the liturgy of worship and praise. He needs nothing from us, yet we know that worship is something He wants us to give back to Him. Jesus says in John 4.23 "the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father is seeking such people to worship him." That is us. We are the true worshipers, honored to perform the work, the liturgy, of worship to God every Sunday and at other times. At the same time, there is an obligation here. Worship isn't just something we get to do, or can choose to do; it's something that we "ought" to do. It is, as our Anglican communion service says, the liturgy of worship is "our duty and our joy."

So, when you hear the word "liturgy," remember it is not something we attend, it is something

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we do. Our liturgy is something we have the great honor of offering to God, our worship. It is a duty, and also our joy as his redeemed people.

Small Groups



Small groups have Biblical roots and are not just a passing fad in the church. It can be argued that churches *treated it* like a fad in the 1980's when organizing small groups became a focus. However, I would argue that small groups are biblical and can be found in the Old Testament most closely associated with households. When God called Noah to build the ark in Gen 7:1, God told Noah that it was for the purpose of saving him and his household. Remember that a household is bigger than our traditional nuclear family. Our New Testament example of a small group

is none other than Jesus and his twelve disciples.

It is worth asking the question; why do churches have small groups? While worship is the primary focus of the church, that is not the only task a church has been given. Remember Jesus' last words urged us to make disciples of all nations. Once we have said yes to Christ, our job is not over! Discipleship is an important focus for churches.

- So, what is the most effective method that God uses to make a person more Christ-like?
- How can God use activities in our lives to teach us to walk in love?
- How does a person experience Christlikeness up close?

While small groups are by no means the *only* method, Jesus himself used small groups effectively with his band of twelve apostles. Jesus was the leader and discipler of his small group, which served as the key way the apostles learned what it meant to follow Jesus, even unto martyrdom for ten of them. In his travels, Jesus spent most of his time within this small group, although naturally, he ministered in larger contexts frequently as well. Jesus' motivation seemed to highlight relationships over organizations, systems or institutions. Jesus' small group was the context for teaching as well as training his new leaders, a context which is easy to reproduce.

I am not disparaging one-on-one meetings or meetings of larger groups of Christians, but there are special dynamics that a small group brings to the fore that make them especially attractive. Having a place to share burdens, celebrate victories, and share life at a deep level can inspire us all to take our faith to a deeper level. You may have heard my January 27th sermon on the central point of 1 Corinthians 12:18 that **God has arranged the members of the body as He chose.** Let us resist the temptation to disengage ourselves from the body here at Epiphany. Committing to a small group of believers who study God's word, pray for one another, and care for one another is one of the most significant decisions a believer can make to put us on a path of being conformed into the image of Christ.

The 46th annual March for Life was held in Washington DC on January 18th.

"This was an incredible experience. Hundreds of thousands of people marching to celebrate life, a gift from God, while at the same time recognizing the need in our society today to defend that life for those who have not yet been born", *Catherine Zimmerman*.

Schools and youth groups from across the country traveled to DC for this event. Groups wore matching hats, scarves or carried signs displaying positive messages that inspired hope. A particular favorite sign read, "our salvation began with an unplanned pregnancy."

On Saturday, January 19th, Michelle Schmidt, who was a director of a crisis pregnancy center in Detroit, Michigan and who also happens to be Catherine's sister, presented to the women of Epiphany a personal testimony of her experiences with counseling and assisting women in making pro-life choices. We greatly appreciated hearing Michelle's heart on this subject, as she spoke openly and honestly about personal experiences and her 30 plus years of research on women's health issues.

Winter Conference 2019

This was my 8th Winter Conference with Cru. My job this year was to design a room for prayer. It was open 24/7 and we had a team of staff who got to meet with students and pray with them if they wanted to pray. It was an amazing, humbling experience to be a part of. Prayer is so powerful. It is a direct line of communication with the God of the universe and I loved getting to intercede for hurting, questioning, growing students. I went back into the prayer room right after 1am on New Year's Eve to close up and saw a girl had signed up for prayer. I texted her and told her I was leaving early in the morning the next day but would love to get together. She showed up at 8:30am and we prayed together for her future and she wept. I was so honored and excited for her desire to trust Jesus and trust me with her story.

Another thing I love about Winter Conference was our Day of Outreach. Over 500 of us were sent to a church on the south side of Baltimore to help them clean up from a flood. We were divided up into teams to paint, pick up trash, pass out flyers in the neighborhood, and pray for the city. It was really sweet to spend 2 hours with girls from my campus and get to help clean the city streets. I'm not going to lie, I wanted to complain and grumble about picking up trash when it was so cold but seeing how the students just did as they were asked and were happy to serve was humbling and encouraging to me!



Western Fairfax Christian Ministries Report for Epiphany by Jan Welch

"As an expression of God's love and a demonstration of the gospel of Jesus Christ, WFCM provides food and financial support to those at risk of homelessness."

Epiphany has supported WFCM since it's creation in 1986 in part by members of Epiphany, and over the years we have continued that support with funds, volunteers and employees. Members have been on the board of directors, part of its staff and some also have received help when needed. The organization is a vital member of the community and is the place to send people when they ask the church or members for help.

In November the Boy Scout program, Scouting for Food, brought in over 62,000 pounds of food. Many of our parishioners contributed to that food drive and each year have given as many as 10 to 26 families Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets.

Each year at the annual October fund drive dinner, several members give generously which helps to fund other WFCM services such as help with rent, utilities, gas, prescriptions and insurance. Volunteers and donors are critical to the organizations' success, and several parishioners give generously of their time weekly and for special programs. In both the office and the pantry volunteers gave 8,572 hours. Including other programs such as the Backpack Collection, Holiday Basket Distribution and many other events, volunteer hours amounted to over 15,000.


