

Easter's Challenge: What if It All Ends Well?



I am not by nature a blindly optimistic person. I'm at least as good at seeing challenges and obstacles as I am at seeing blessings and opportunities. Maybe you can relate.

But Easter challenges that in me. How can I be anything other than optimistic about everything when I see Jesus Christ alive on Easter morning? To quote the English mystic Julian of Norwich, *"All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of thing shall be well."*

Now, I know that makes for an encouraging, but vague, thought this Easter season. But how do we actually apply it? Here are two suggestions.

First, we should rest a little easier as we look over the vast cultural changes our nation is currently undergoing. To name one obvious example, it's true that the Supreme Court is likely to redefine marriage this summer (I'll be happy to be wrong about this). In all kinds of other ways, some of which are at least as discouraging than marriage's redefinition, our nation is moving in a cultural direction different than what we as Christians can support. As committed disciples of Jesus Christ in this increasingly post-Christian culture, I am afraid we are going to have to get used to being "weird" instead of "mainstream" in the culture we are living in, at least for a time.

But you know what? *"All shall be well."* The truth is that Christians have a long and fruitful history of being different than the culture they are in, and an equally long, but often sad, history of being largely the same as the culture they are in. Let's embrace that and trust that while things won't be as easy in a culture where our Christian beliefs and values face rejection, and, sometimes, hostility, the Gospel is still good news, and the Christian way of life is still worth living and commanding to others. Let's also take advantage of the increasing number of opportunities we can all expect to have to give an answer for the hope that is in us that will come with living lives that look different in many ways from these new cultural norms.

Speaking of the hope that is in us, my second suggestion is that we recognize just how unique our belief is that things will end well, and share that with our friends this Easter season. Most of the people around us try not to think about how things will end for them. Without Jesus and the

resurrection, there is just death on the individual level, and the Second Law of Thermodynamics (things come apart) on the universal level. Neither of these are things that bring meaning and joy into life. In contrast, we know something amazing about how things end. We know that we are loved by a good God who created us for a purpose. We know that death is not the final answer. We know that the best, in fact better than we can ever imagine, is yet to come for those who love Jesus. How can we not be excited about these things no matter what?

“*All shall be well*,” friends. In fact, all is already well in ways we barely understand through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. May we carry that knowledge with us gladly as we go about our lives this month.

There is no right or wrong way of fulfilling this faith commitment and there certainly will not be someone checking to make sure everyone is giving. 


Lenten Fundraisers

First, the youth group participated in World Vision's 30 Hour Famine on Marcy 13-14 in which participants voluntarily go without food for 30 hours while learning about poverty and raising money for World Vision's work around the world. Second, the children's ministry sponsored Epiphany's participation in the Anglican Relief and Development Fund's mite box project. The mite box project promotes prayer for the poor of the world and raises money for ARDF's development work around the world. This year the 30 Hour Famine raised \$290 and the mite box project raised \$530.28!

Missions Update: SAT-7

It is not always feasible or prudent to rely on personal interaction to spread the Word globally. For example, in many Middle East and North Africa countries, legal, cultural, or security barriers prevent Christian missionaries from working openly. An organization that Epiphany supports, SAT-7, tries to fill the spiritual void in that part of the world by broadcasting satellite shows in Arabic, Farsi, and Turkish. SAT-7's mission is to "show viewers God's love, give local churches in the region a satellite TV platform to educate and encourage their communities, combat misconceptions about the Christian faith in the region, work inter-denominationally, and foster bridges of understanding with the much larger non-Christian majority without compromising the truth of God's Word." Here are some comments from people in the region about SAT-7's work:



- **A woman from Iraq**

"Dear SAT-7. I am very sad for losing my father this year in one of the explosions. But the Lord spoke to me and the Holy Spirit encouraged me through your great programs. SAT-7 is the only source of comfort for what my country (Iraq) and I are going through."

- **A man from Palestine**

"We would like to commend you for this unique ministry. Arab Christians lacked for a long time such programs that deal with Christian issues from an Arab point of view. Because we are aware of the great impact of SAT-7 on the Arab world we offer our TV studio facilities to cooperate with SAT-7."

- **A man from Iran**

"I really like "In Step with Christ." Can you start teaching about the New Testament from the beginning?"

- **A man from Tunisia**

"Being in touch with SAT-7 opened my eyes to the fact that accepting Jesus in my heart is my only way out of a sinful life. I decided to pursue God's plan for the salvation of my soul. I prayed asking for forgiveness of my sins and I confessed Jesus as my Savior."

- **A woman from Jordan**

"I am so glad that we have an Arabic Christian channel at last. My family and I watch SAT-7 a lot."

- **A man from Algeria**

"I want to tell you that many people in my country receive the love of God revealed in Christ Jesus through watching SAT-7's programs."

Evensong




Please join the Choir and Clergy of Church Of The Epiphany for Choral Evensong on May 17th at 7:00pm.

Epiphany's Congregational Health Committee Starts Work

As a part of thinking through the results of the Natural Church Development survey we took at the end of 2014, Epiphany's vestry has formed a "Congregational Health Team." Team members are Sally McNeely (chair), Andrew Plummer, Fred Apelquist, Courtney Turner, Jessica Monroe, Jeff Zimmerman, and Ryan Brukardt.

What follows is a basic outline of the team's findings, purpose and work.

- **Where are we as a church?** - Epiphany is in a good place. We are in good shape and doing well as a church body.
- **Who are we?** – As we transition clergy leadership, we have an opportunity at this time to take stock of ourselves so that we can make good decisions about our future direction based on an accurate understanding of our strengths, weaknesses and opportunities as a church.
- **Why are we doing this?** - Our goal is to do the work to make sure we are walking in sync with God's will for our church
 - Example – Vacation Bible School has changed, yet grown considerably since we moved to our new location – what does that tell us about God's will for us here?
- **How we will do this?** – We have options and have chosen to utilize this resource of Natural Church Development process and the Rev. Tom Herrick, our diocese's canon for church planting and mission, to organize the work we are doing in a thoughtful way.
- **What can the congregation expect?**
 - We have given ourselves a goal of one year to complete the work of systematically clarifying our church's strengths, weaknesses and God's direction for us.
 - We started with taking the Natural Church Development survey of selected church members (intended to be a subset such as with polling) - Accomplished
 - We have called together a team dedicated to completing this work (committee is under the oversight of the Vestry) – Accomplished
 - Team's first priority is to outline our response to what the survey is telling us – Accomplished
 - Teams second priority is to engage with the congregation to gain additional information about where they believe God is leading us – In process
 - First will engage with the small groups
 - Second will develop focus groups for feedback
 - Team will make recommendations of Action to the vestry based on what our work tells us about Epiphany's strengths, weaknesses and opportunities for ministry.
 - Vestry will consider the recommendations and act appropriately

Note – one of the tasks of the vestry and rector is to discern the vision for this church – our role is to be informed by that vision in what we are doing and to provide feedback to the vestry during this process which the vestry may wish to incorporate in their work.

WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP RETREAT 2015

Nearly 50 women attended our annual retreat on 17 and 18 April in Chantilly, Virginia. This year we shortened the agenda from a three-day weekend to a Friday and Saturday event which allowed approximately 33 percent of our ladies, 16 and older, to attend. We gathered Friday evening for a light supper and a time of fellowship before hearing from our speaker, Desiree Barker. Desiree continued her teaching on Saturday with a number of spiritual exercises designed to bring us closer to the Lord. We were further blessed by special times of worship led by Constance Douglas and Brittney Marcum. We closed with the celebration of the Eucharist lead by Fr. Peter.



This year we set out to try something new and to make the women's retreat more accessible to those who may not be able to travel away for a full weekend. We had a number of ladies come to their first women's retreat, as well as several guests who joined us to build new relationships. During the retreat, we asked those in attendance to consider some options for next year. Most of those responding indicated they would prefer a location nearby or that we alternate our retreat location between someplace local and a retreat center away. If we do travel away from home, most prefer that we not travel more than two hours from home. The majority preferred that we host the retreat in April or May, with slightly more preferring April. And most would like to keep the total cost under \$200.

We thank all of those who provided feedback in this first survey. We will be giving those of you who were unable to attend the retreat a chance to share your thoughts in the near future. In the meantime, we are looking at cost-effective options for our 2016 retreat—away from home and not in a hotel. Finally, we are looking for someone who is interested in helping to lead the retreat next year and to transition to leading the 2017 retreat. This is a great way to learn about the process in preparation for leading the next two or three years. 
