

From the Rector:

Moving Forward: What will Change, What will Stay the Same?



What will change? What will stay the same? These are perfectly normal questions to be wondering about during a leadership transition. As I begin my service as Epiphany's third rector, I want to let you know what I am thinking and praying about as we begin this next season of Epiphany's ministry.

First, through God's generosity and Fr. Robin's steady leadership, **Epiphany is in a good place.**

That means there isn't a mandate for immediate, significant change to our church. That means you can expect Epiphany to basically look and feel and act like the Epiphany you know when you come to church this September. We will be continuing ministries and activities that we have done in the past, including the parish weekend October 24-26 (see page 3 for more details). Sunday worship will use the same liturgies and we will do things in (mostly) the same way that Epiphany has done them in the past.

Secondly, while there isn't a mandate for immediate significant change, **this is an opportunity for Epiphany to take stock** and reevaluate how and why we do what we do and whether or not it is effective. I intend for Epiphany to take that opportunity. As I have already mentioned, one immediate step I am taking is to invite the Rev. Dr. Tom Herrick of the Titus Institute to help us both evaluate how we are functioning as a church and help us work towards an agreed mission and action plan for the next few years. The vestry will meet with him for the first time on September 9.

Another thing we will be working on this fall is **how we welcome and incorporate new members to our church.** As part of that process, I have talked with Tom Will, who has led

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the Ambassador ministry for many years, and we agree that it is time to retire that effort and bring together a new group built from the ground up to help people find their place at Epiphany. Watch the Candle email newsletter for more information about this. Thank you to all who have served as ambassadors over the years. I've heard a many stories of how Ambassadors welcomed people to our church in the past. While it is time to do something different, my hope is that many past ambassadors will consider once again sharing their welcome, wisdom and enthusiasm with the people God calls to Epiphany.

The final big change we will be taking on this fall involves staffing. In discussion with the wardens, it is my clear sense that Epiphany needs to move forward with two full-time priests instead of the three of the last few years. This means I won't be filling my past position of Senior Associate Rector, and Fr. Michael's current position of Associate Minister for Discipleship will ultimately be phased out as well and replaced by a new associate rector position. Of course Epiphany's commitment to children and youth ministry will not be phased out. These things will be a big part of the associate rector's position. However, I will need this position to "do more" as well when it comes to helping me lead Epiphany.

This necessary restructuring also does not necessarily mean that Fr. Michael will leave Epiphany. Instead, just as I was the first candidate to be Epiphany's next rector, Fr. Michael is my first candidate to be Epiphany's associate rector. Just as both the vestry and I needed to seriously discern whether or not I was called to be Epiphany's next rector, Fr. Michael and Epiphany's leadership will need your prayers as we discern together whether or not he is called to serve our church in this new, expanded, capacity. I have asked Mark Oliphant to join with me and the personnel committee (Janice Wolfe, Merle Stromberg, Ron Harp and George Hamlin) in doing this work in the next few months.

With this staffing reconfiguration comes a number of practical issues we will need to work out. The most significant issue is simply how we continue to serve Epiphany well with a smaller staff. Please pray for the vestry, clergy and staff as we work together to get all of the bases covered.

Epiphany is also served very ably by volunteer clergy. I'm very glad to report that I have asked and, with Bishop John's support, Deacon Dave Welch has agreed to continue his ministry with us. Fr. David Browning will also continue to occasionally serve our church as he works on his doctoral degree at Catholic University. While we are still working on scheduling, Fr. David will be leading a study on our new Anglican catechism beginning sometime this fall or winter.

Friends, I'm excited about what God has ahead for our church. As we go forward, I'll do my best to communicate "what's coming" to you in a timely manner. Feel free to stop by or give me a call if you have questions or thoughts. In the meantime, see you on Sunday at Epiphany!

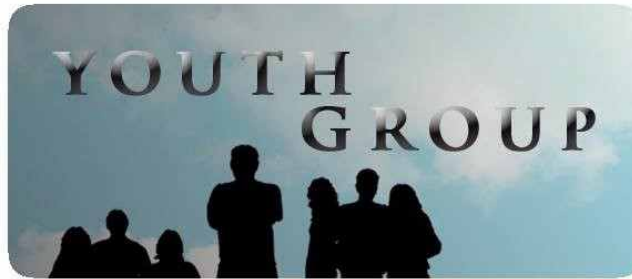


“Faith, Hope and Love” - Parish Weekend October 24-26

I cannot thank the tremendous volunteer team enough for their incredible work at this camp. The camp was a huge success, and our volunteers were amazing.



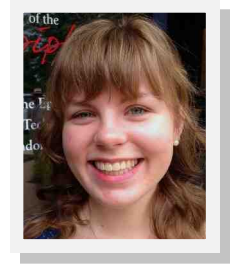

I hope you will express our thanks to your people in worship and show them these pictures! We are united in the Gospel.

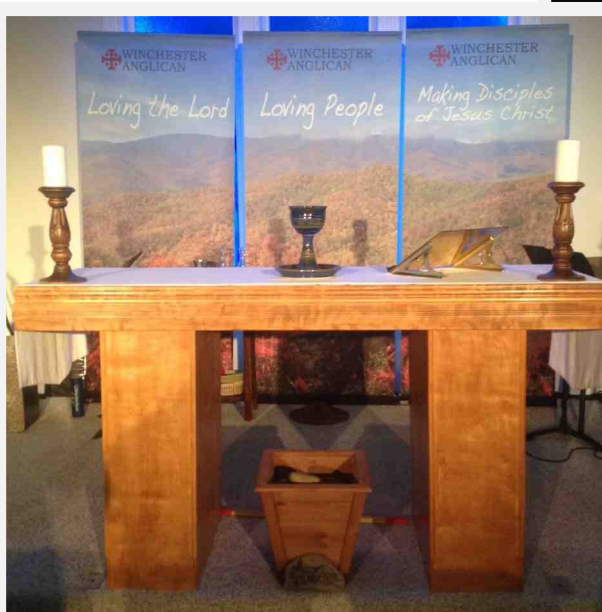

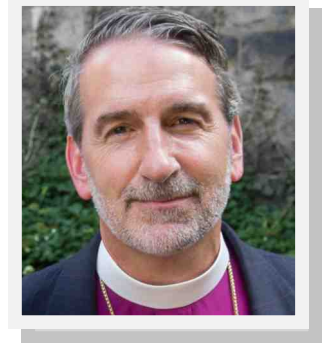

WE MUST NOT BE SILENT

“As Christians in the West, it is appalling how most of our government leaders and the secular press have been silent. It is a genocide and humanitarian crisis of the likes we have not seen since World War II.”

Archbishop Foley Beach has issued an appeal for prayer and action on behalf of Christians under immediate threat in places like Iraq and Syria. Please read his appeal in its entirety below.

Greetings in the Name our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! May God grant you the abundance of His Grace as you follow Him day by day!



If you have been paying attention to what is happening in the Middle East in recent months, you will note that those who are Christians are being brutally murdered, women and girls raped and forced into marriage, experiencing all kinds of torture, and hundreds of thousands have been forced out of their homes and countries. We are seeing communities who date to the 1st Century with their Christian presence being totally annihilated and killed. Historic churches, holy sites, and tombs are being completely destroyed - all in the name of Allah.

In Syria many of our brothers and sisters are engulfed by an ongoing humanitarian crisis. Areas of Aleppo that are home to around 400,000 Christians have been besieged and surrounded by the rebels for months. Many Christians have become malnourished owing to shortages and skyrocketing prices of food and other essentials. Access to water, electricity and communications is very limited. Hundreds of thousands of other Syrians have fled to Jordan where they are living in poverty and confined in tent cities and cardboard homes.

In Iraq hundreds of thousands of believers have fled their homes, reducing the Christian population to a quarter of the size it was in 1990. Many took refuge in Syria or Lebanon, while others are internally displaced in the autonomous region of Iraqi Kurdistan, which once provided relative peace and stability. But Iraqi Christian refugees are no longer safe in Syria, as anti-Christian violence threatens all Christians in the country, while Iraqi Kurdistan is now also seeing escalating tensions; Christians also struggle to find work to support themselves there. Recent events in Mosul have seen the city's Christian population totally exterminated by murder or the evacuation of Christians. Pictures of heads of Christians hanging from telephone wires, crucifixions, and other acts of brutality are heart-wrenching.

This brutality is being led by a group called the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIS). Their goal is to reinstate the Islamic caliphate and rule the whole of the Middle East and eventually the world by Sharia Law. Their tactics are pure evil, and they will stop at nothing to accomplish their purposes.

I am writing asking you to do several things. As Christians in the West, it is appalling how most of our government leaders and the secular press have been silent. It is a genocide and humanitarian crisis of the likes we have not seen since WWII. We must not be silent!

1) Would you join me in prayer for our sisters and brothers? Would you in your personal prayers and in the Prayers of the People pray for those being persecuted, those doing the persecuting, and for a solution? Would you pour out your heart in prayer and fasting before God on their behalf? See prayers below.

2) Would you call or write your government representatives and ask them to do something to help the situation? They will not attempt to help if they don't think you care. Right now, they don't think you care.

3) The following ministries are engaged in helping refugees. Please offer them your prayers and support.

- Barnabas Fund—"The mission of the Barnabas Fund is to support Christians where they are in a minority and suffer discrimination, oppression and persecution as a consequence of their faith."

- Voice of Ishmael (via Commission to Every Nation)—Bringing hope that changes communities in the Middle East and North Africa.

- Christ Church Jerusalem - Ministering to Refugees of the Crisis. Please write "Iraqi refugees" in the memo line.

Please join me in interceding on behalf of our Christian sisters and brothers.

O God, you have made of one blood all the peoples of the earth, and sent your blessed Son to preach peace to those who are far off and to those who are near: Grant that people everywhere may seek after you and find you, especially in Syria and Iraq; bring the nations into your fold; pour out your Spirit upon all flesh; and hasten the coming of your kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Coates Elementary School

In January 2013 our Home Group assumed this task which Ann Bracy had done so well since October 2012. Overall since this program started two years ago Epiphany has delivered over 10,320 meals + 3,440 snacks for the needy kids of Coates Elementary!

Our Home Group will again be blessed with coordinating and assembling the food bags for this third school year. We have been asked this year to provide bags for 60 students each month. We plan to give you brief periodic reports during the school year on how things are going.

AND you all made it possible! This **Epiphany** effort did not go unnoticed by the school: “Thanks so much [Epiphany] for supporting us this school year! All of the food bags have been delivered to the students.”

Coats Food Bags: We are requesting home groups, families, and individuals to fill one gallon Ziploc bags, each with 2 Breakfast items, 2 Lunches, 2 Dinners, and 2 Snacks. See following page for more information and Q&A on building the food bags.

The first delivery of 60 bags to Coates is 1 October, which means we will need your contributions by 28 September at the latest. Just bring them to the church and place in the baskets as you enter. Look for more info in the weekly bulletin and Candle.

Helping Hungry Kids Program: 2014-15

Each month Epiphany prepares and delivers 60 food bags to Coates Elementary for children in need so they will have 3 meals and a snack for each weekend day.

Food Bags: Instructions and Sample Food List

In a one gallon Ziploc bag include:

2 Breakfast items + 2 Lunch items + 2 Dinner items + 2 Snacks

These are small individual servings you can find in any grocery store. Here are suggestions on what to put into the bags:

Breakfast	Lunch & Dinner	Snacks
Milk (shelf stable cow's or soy or other non-dairy)	Beef entrees (i.e. Chef Boyardee pastas)	Fruit cups Applesauce cups Pudding cups
Oatmeal	Non beef entrees (items with chicken, tuna, vegetarian) Individual Mac & Cheese Ramen Noodles	Sweet snacks (granola bars, cookies, etc.)
Dry Cereal	Soups	Salty snacks (microwave popcorn, pretzels, crackers)
Cereal Bars		Dried fruits/raisins
		Hot chocolate

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS:

Q: Can fresh fruit be included?

A: No, these bags are not refrigerated and may be stored for a number of weeks

Q: Do I have to get the items you list?

A: No, these are suggestions.

Q: Can I do more than one bag each month?

A: YES! You are encouraged to involve your children, home group, bible study, etc.

Q: When can I bring in the food bags to Epiphany?

A: Any time, but the deadline is the last Sunday of the month before delivery.

Any other suggestions?

A: Yes Since we will be doing 60 bags each month, it is suggested that you buy these items in quantity (e.g. Mac & Cheese comes in packages of 6 or 12).

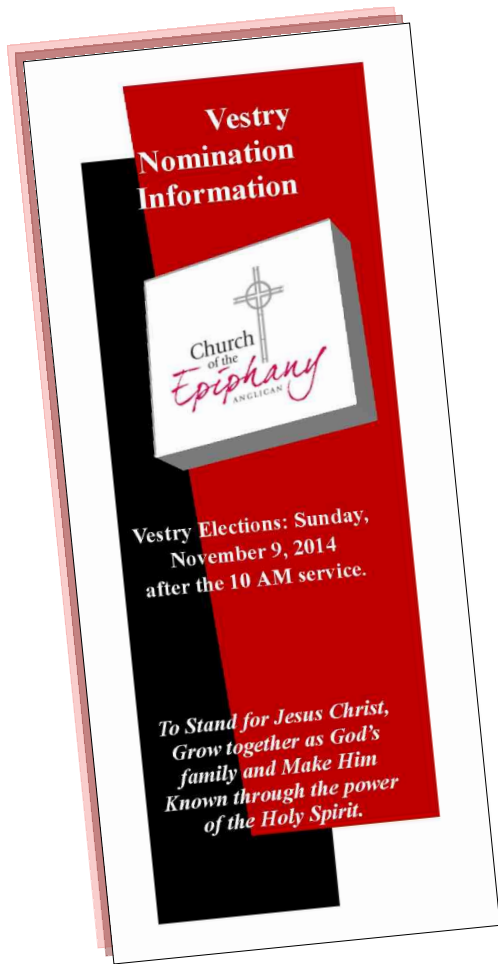
Vestry Elections
