

Sabbath – After the Storm



As I write this, we are a couple of days into the cleanup after our historic snowstorm Jan. 22-23. Snow is piled up to my office window (and a bit beyond). Schools are closed, and will probably remain closed for several days. Many of us are starting to see snow-clearing equipment make it into our neighborhoods for the first time.



Even though it will take some time for things to get back to normal, we have a lot to be grateful for here in Northern Virginia. First, and foremost, I am grateful that God sent light, powdery snow, instead of the heavy wet variety we usually get. I am also grateful that the wind that came with the storm wasn't as powerful as predicted. Together, these facts meant that for the vast majority of us, our power and heat stayed on through the storm. Thank you, God!

God also gave us something else through this storm. Something I think we are starving for, but most of the time, don't realize we need. He gave Northern Virginia a Sabbath. There were no cars rushing by on Highway 50 just to the south of our house. We could run no errands. We couldn't go to work. All we could do was rest, worship as a family on Sunday morning, and be together.

I know that in our house, these last several days have been very good for us. They have brought us together as a family. They have created an enforced space for rest, in the middle of our scheduled lives.

I hope you have experienced something similar. It can be hard to choose to rest, particularly if you are a doer, like I am (though it seems obvious in hindsight, it was a very difficult choice for me to cancel church services on Sunday, Jan. 24). Rest is not a bad thing. In fact, regular times of rest are commanded by God. *"Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it holy"* (Exodus 20.8). While

Relocation Fund Growing: \$113,865.45 Set Aside So Far "Joshua Committee" Exploring Options for Future

As Epiphany approaches the beginning of our fourth year at our current location, it is time to begin to discern together what God has for us when our initial lease concludes in October of 2017 (Epiphany has two one-year lease extensions beyond that date). To that end, Epiphany's finance committee is setting aside money to cover costs connected to a potential move in a "Relocation Fund" and the vestry has reactivated the "Joshua Committee" under the leadership of Tom Will, who served as Epiphany's Senior Warden for 2013-14.

"I have charged the Joshua Committee with three tasks: identify what we need in a church facility, look at location possibilities, and explore what meeting these needs will cost. If a move is what God has for it, our goal is to make it a move that enables us to minister more effectively and gives us a permanent location for years to come. I expect the Joshua Committee will report back to us at our annual meeting this coming November," said the Rev. Peter Frank, Epiphany's rector.

Other Joshua Committee members are Jan Welch and Catherine Zimmerman. Beth Monroe has been elected by the vestry to be their liaison to the Joshua Committee.

While costs of a potential move are unknown and will likely require special giving by the congregation to support, the finance committee is committed to setting aside money given now as we are able in a "Relocation Fund." Through very generous giving by the congregation this fall and winter, that fund already has a balance of \$113,865.45.

"God has walked with Epiphany on every stage of our journey. I am confident we are off to a good start in discerning what he has next for us," said Fr. Peter.



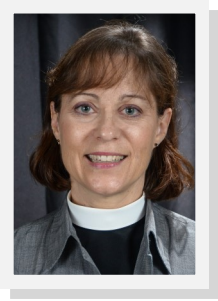

I groan when I play the game with others who are more cut-throat and are willing to blight productivity. I have played the game when a resource is blighted and it is not fun. That particular player is not the only one who is affected; we all are.

I was reminded of this again when I heard one of the reasons that the snow-plow was not going to show up in our neighborhood. Lack of gas! The weather people had told us to stock up on gas before the big storm so we all heeded that warning without realizing the outcome. Our cars with full gas tanks remained stuck in 2 and half feet of snow but the equipment could not work because they were lacking a necessary resource. I am reminded that “if one member suffers, all suffer together” from 1 Corinthians 12:26. Being self-sufficient is held in such high regard in our culture that we can go about much of every day life without realizing our mutual interdependence of one another.

I have found Epiphany to be a loving community but does that mean we can't grow in this area? How wide is our concept of community? Do we suffer with the sufferings of our literal neighbors, or even our wider body of Christ around the world? As we grow in discipleship, God gives us an ever-increasing capacity to love others further, wider, and more culturally different. My prayer is that we appropriate more of God's heart, being willing to suffer with the others who are suffering.

Alpha Program at Epiphany

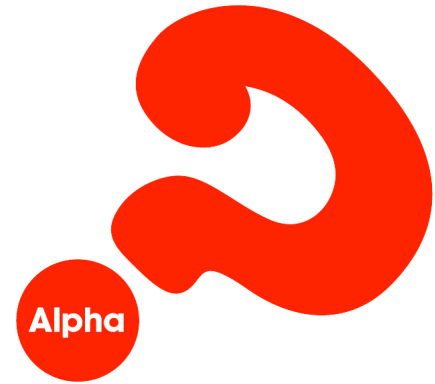
March 29 – June 14

Mark your calendars. Epiphany will host the wildly popular and worldwide sensation Alpha beginning the Tuesday after Easter (March 29) and most every Tuesday thereafter through June 14th.

What is “Alpha,” you ask?

When I first heard about this Program the name “Alpha” confused and puzzled me. Alpha. First letter in Greek alphabet. The first. A beginning. Hmmm. So?

But Alpha is good for Christians at all stages of their faith. At least, that's my story and I'm sticking to it.

Our Small Group will take a break from our weekly sessions and attend Alpha instead. I suspect other Groups may do the same. As a result, we should be blessed with a great turnout.

While attending all 12 sessions would be highly enjoyable and fulfilling, I recognize people's schedules are full. That's OK. The way Alpha is designed, each event is self-standing. Each topic is understandable on its own. Of course, the more sessions you attend, the more enjoyable will be your experience. I don't know of anyone who will be able to attend every event. I know I can't. But, attend however many (or few) you can. You won't regret it.

Please don't forgot to invite friends and neighbors even if they are not Christians, or especially because they are not Christians. Perhaps they would like to know something about Christianity. Tell them it will be educational and there is no pressure to say or do anything – just listen and learn. If they like, they can participate in the informal table discussions, too.

Food, fun, fellowship, and focus on the Christian message. Sounds like a good deal to me.

Pamela's work as our interim.

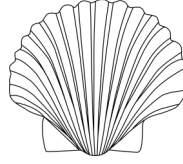
STAR Deadline Changed
