Answering the Right Question

"Very few people are looking for a theological answer - theologians maybe. Normal people - they have an existential question."

Daniel Liberek, a missionary pastor in Belgium we support as a church, said this in a thought-provoking interview (available as a youtube video here: https://youtu.be/zRlBMqBhQao). He was talking about his work as an evangelist in a post-Christian culture.

In some ways, this feels a bit disappointing to me (and maybe to you). I am a professional theological-answer-knower. I think the theological answers we have as Christians are robust and more than able to stand on their own two feet in an argument. I enjoy educating others about this, whether they like it or not.

But Daniel Liberek's observation certainly fits my own experience. Most people I know who have become Christian haven't done so because someone finally explained the eternal procession of the Holy Spirit from the Father and the Son (or some other concept) in a way that is theologically satisfactory. Instead, they believed for much more practical reasons. They knew a Christian or Christians and saw how their faith shaped their life in positive ways. They got invited to be part of a church. Someone who was a Christian was there for them in the middle of a crisis or emergency. Prayers got answered.

At the same time, most of the people I know who have left Christianity haven't really done so because of theology (though they may give some theological reasons after the fact). Instead, they are often disappointed by God, or the church. They have a sense that they are not loved or that they don't matter. Or, increasingly in our culture, they just succumbed to the endless messaging we are all bombarded with that God is not relevant to modern life. If that is the case, all the good theology in the world is not enough to cover over the rift.

So, what does this mean for us? Well, one thing it means is that you don't have to be a theologian or an apologist to evangelize. Our lives and our genuine care for other people as fellow creatures in the image of our creator are more of a witness that Jesus is alive than our theological words will ever be to most of our neighbors. It also means we are probably best

to focus on continuing the relationship more than winning the argument when theological matters come up.

We could ask ourselves, "why are we talking about theology right now?" and "What is the question behind the question?" Who knows what we might find, and how we might be able to offer not just an answer, but Christ's presence through us to people who need him.

How We Grow the Faith of our Kids at Epiphany

Some of you are keenly aware of the responsibility to disciple your children. It is nearly top of the list for families with children who are seeking a new church. How is the church helping the children to grow in the faith? Whether we are thinking about our own children or those of would-be guests, you want to know if Epiphany can help. If parents are not confident, secure, and hopeful about the discipleship of our youngest members, they will go elsewhere. "Building a multi-generational congregation that loves children and families" is so important that it is one of our chief emphases here at Epiphany.

But this goes beyond the Sunday school teaching time. What the kids get in that class is a well-designed curriculum that will take them through the entire Bible in three years with an emphasis on the Gospel story every single Sunday. But we Anglicans engage with our bodies as well as our minds. We have a sacramental view of our liturgical practices. Baptism and communion are two important sacraments that reach us when we are still children. Most children are baptized as infants, but we wait until our children are old enough to know what is happening before we offer them communion. We want to make sure they know what they are doing. Some children are keen to participate early on and others need to be coaxed along a bit. Because children mature at different rates, we let parents tell us when they think their kids are ready for communion preparation. COVID protocols from the last two years have thrown off our regular rhythm, so we are trying to get back into the practice of offering communion classes to children if you want and need this. Some families feel confident to prepare their own children to take communion and we are fine with that. Other families would prefer us to present the richness of communion to minds which are still being formed.

Next Holy Land Pilgrimage Oct. 30-Nov. 9 2023

Traveling to the Holy Land and walking where Jesus walked is a life-changing and faith building experience. Epiphany will be going on pilgrimage October 30 - November 9 in 2023. While our trip is still more than a year off, details are beginning to come together.

During our ten-day trip, we will be spending time in Galilee, the mountains of Judea, the Negev, Samaria, and of course the Old City of Jerusalem. When we are in Jerusalem, we will be staying at the Christ Church guest house. Christ church is Jerusalem's Anglican church and also the oldest protestant church in the city. It is also just inside the Jaffa Gate of the Old City, just a few minutes-walk from the Church of the Holy Sepulcher (Jesus' tomb) and Golgotha, the Western Wall, the Via Dola Rosa and countless other amazing locations.

While inflation and increased travel costs are a reality, the trip is reasonably priced, at \$2,804 assuming 20 travelers. To this, we will need to add the cost of plane tickets (which we will get as a group).


Christmas Morning Lessons and Carols
