From the Rector: Month One



People regularly ask me "How are things going?" at Epiphany these days. They are going very well.

It's been a busy month of transitions. Being the new Rector means lots of learning. I'm particularly appreciative of all of the folks who have agreed to have lunch, a cup of coffee, or make time in their work schedule for a phone call to bring me up to speed on various ministries and projects ongoing in

the church. We're making progress in a number of areas that I hope to be able to report on more fully in the near future, including welcoming newcomers, identifying candidates for this year's vestry election (Nov. 9) and connecting our prayer requests with more Epiphany intercessors.

I'm also appreciative of those who have already stepped into new roles as part of this transition. I am particularly thrilled that we were able to quickly build the new associate rector's position, the need for which I reported on in last month's Star, prayerfully consider Fr. Michael Guernsey as our first candidate, and then successfully call him to this new work. While it's not quite true, it also seems like nearly every weekly "Candle" newsletter has included reports of new volunteers stepping into leadership. I'm grateful for all of them. One thing that is abundantly clear to me a

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month into this work is that I cannot, and I have not been called, to lead alone at Epiphany.

While we have been doing this structural work, Epiphany isn't standing still. In this issue of the Star, you'll find information about two significant events in October I'd like you to be a part of.

October 12 - Installation: The first is my installation as Epiphany's rector. In a nutshell, this event, at 10 am on Sunday, October 12, marks the my official "commissioning" for the

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work that the vestry has called me to do. Of course, I'm happy for you to be there for me, but I'm even more excited by the fact that Bishop John Guernsey will be with us to lead the service. Also, the Rev. Canon Mary Maggard Hays, a significant mentor in ministry for me, will be delivering the sermon. This will be a special day with special guests at Epiphany. Plan to be there.

October 24-26 - Parish Weekend: How do we go about living as Christians in the real world? I'm excited that we will have a good friend and seminary professor of mine, Dr. Phil Harrold, with us October 24-26 to discuss this topic by considering what are often called the "cardinal virtues" of Christian life: Faith, Hope and Love. The presenter is good. The time commitment is manageable (Friday evening and Saturday morning, and then Sunday worship). There will be food. Look for sign up information on the website (www.epiphanyanglican.net) and a more complete article about the event on page 6 in this issue of the Star.

Thanks again for all your help and prayers as we together go through this leadership transition. Good things are happening at Epiphany!

Bishop John Guernsey will be at Epiphany to install the Rev. Peter Frank as Rector on Sunday, Oct. 12, at 10 am. Peter's installation as rector marks the formal giving of authority from the bishop and the vestry to Peter for his ministry at our church. It is a joyful service and all are invited to participate and stay for an informal reception following worship.

At Peter's request, the Rev. Canon Mary Maggard Hays, canon missioner for the Diocese of Pittsburgh, as well as a former clergy staff member at Truro Anglican Church in Fairfax and All Saints Anglican Church in Dale City, will be preaching. Peter worked with Canon Mary during his time as communications director for Archbishop Robert Duncan, and considers her a key mentor in his ministry.

Choral Evensong

Evening Prayer is a liturgy that is used in the Anglican tradition and celebrated in the late afternoon or evening. When the office is rendered chorally it is known at Evensong. Evensong is one of the oldest traditions of the Church. Prayer and Praise is the essence of this service. If you have never experienced evensong please come and be with us to this holy and peaceful close of the day and the beginning of your week. The Choir will be min-

istering the works of Peter August Schnecker who came to America in 1865. He became the Assistant Organist at St. Thomas Church New York, and later became the Music Director at West Presbyterian Church in New York.



My Favorite Bible Verse

Do you have a favorite Bible verse? Is there a verse (or two) that "gets" you every time you read it?

My favorite verses in the Bible are Luke 24:5-6. It was the Sunday morning after Jesus has been crucified, and some women had gone to the tomb to care for Jesus' dead body. When they arrive they find the tomb open and angels who say to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!" I don't plan to ever get a tattoo, but if I did it would probably be these words. Every time I read them, I can't help but smile.



Why? Because this is the final and essential piece of the Gospel message of Jesus—Jesus didn't stay dead!

In 2008 I had the privilege of being a delegate at a worldwide Anglican gathering in Jerusalem. One day I visited a place called "The Garden Tomb" which is probably not the actual place of Jesus' tomb but is an ancient tomb near Jerusalem. After exploring the small garden for a bit the guide who was showing us around invited us to step into the tomb. I remember the awe of stepping into what some people believe was actually Jesus' tomb. It was fascinating to see first-hand the inside of an ancient stone tomb cut into the side of a rocky hill. But what has been imprinted in my mind is not the tomb, but what happened as I left it. As I stepped back out of the tomb the guide said to me, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!"

Of course, the empty tomb does not prove that Jesus rose from the dead. For two thousand years people have tried to come up with alternative explanations for why Jesus' body was not in the tomb. I am convinced that the Christian answer that Jesus did in fact rise bodily from the dead makes the most sense of the evidence and that no other answer comes close to being satisfactory. But, objective evidence aside, I am convinced that he is alive because I know him. I spent time talking with him this morning. I have met with him in places of joy

and pain. I have seen him transform my life. I have experienced his leading and guidance. I have encountered him as he has answered prayers. And, I know that Christians past and present have known him as well.

Brothers and sisters, Jesus is not in the tomb. He is risen!

"Faith, Hope and Love: Following Jesus in the Real World" Epiphany's parish weekend with Dr. Phil Harrold Oct. 24-26



Being a Christian includes a call to a certain kind of life as a response to God's grace in Jesus Christ – one shaped by Faith, Hope and Love (1 Corinthians 13.13), but how do we live that kind of life, and who can we learn from as we travel that way at home and at work here in Northern Virginia?

Dr. Phil Harrold, associate professor of church history at Trinity seminary will be our guide Oct. 24-26 as we spend time together considering this question at this year's parish weekend.

As we go on the journey, we will be exploring both what the Bible says, focusing particularly on 1 Corinithians 13 and Philippians 2:1-13, and also on the wisdom of significant Christian thinkers, such as Augustine of Hippo, Benedict of Nursia, and Matthew Tyndale.

Sunday, October 26 – Sermon by Dr. Harrold

"I am looking forward to having Dr. Harrold with us. He is a gifted teacher who will help us not only learn, but apply what we are learning to our lives. Ultimately, our practicing of the virtues of faith, hope, and love, is following the path of Jesus, whose own perfect faith, hope and love led him to the cross and our salvation," said the Rev. Peter Frank, Epiphany's rector.

Interview with the Archbishop By Jacob Stubbs

Jacob Stubbs is a M.A.R. student at Yale Divinity School. Previously, he has researched at a state-level policy organization in Atlanta, GA, and has served as a Fellow at the John Jay Institute. In this in-depth interview covering a wide-range of topics, Archbishop Beach shares his vision for social engagement by the Anglican Church in North America.

The following are excerpts from the interview by Jacob Stubs for *Juicy Ecumenicalism*, the official blog of the Institute on Religion & Democracy. Read the interview in full here.

Q: Can you tell us a brief version of your testimony? How did the situation in which you grew up shape your call to pastoral ministry? How has it shaped your social vision for the Anglican Church?

Abp. Beach: Well, I think the simplest way is, I was raised in a broken home. Out of that brokenness, I got involved in the Baptist church where I received Jesus as my Lord and Savior. I then went off to high school and got involved in the ministry of Young Life, which really helped shape me and get my relationship with the Lord on track.

This influenced me in many different ways. Because I was in and out of **so many** different schools, I learned how to relate to many people. So, when people are walking in a crowd or seeing people come into our church that I don't know, it's not difficult for me to meet them.

I think another aspect is that it has given me a sensitivity to the brokenness in our families and the need of the church, in the name of Jesus, try to minister and care for the broken people in our midst. Of course, in the culture, that brokenness exists as well. And so, trying to have a heart for people in pain and bringing God's healing touch through Jesus, I think that's a big part of how the situation in which I grew up shaped me.

Q: Who are your models or inspirations for your ministry as both a priest and bishop?


Abp. Beach: To have one person is really impossible. I think one modern person I would say that's had a good impact is a man by the name of Sam Shoemaker. He was an Episcopal priest in Pittsburgh, and was really behind the emphasis of "let's let Pittsburgh be known more for God than for steel." He was a spiritual leader who created a lot of social ministries and family ministries to reach people with the Gospel. He was the person who was behind AA (Alcoholics Anonymous).

There's a book he wrote and a poem out of that book called I Stand at the Door. The whole thesis is about a person who comes to the Lord and into the door of the House of God. The poem talks about all of these vast rooms in the House of God. Some go down the theological wing, and some get involved in ecstatic experiences. But, Shoemaker said, 'My place is by the door. I stand near the door.'

This theme weaves throughout the whole poem: 'To help people put their hands on the doorknob. To help people get in the door. To help people find their way into the House of God.' I would say this theme is something that's at the center of all of my ministry—helping people find the Lord wherever they may be.
