

A Quick Tour of Epiphany's Natural Church Development Survey Results.



This past November, 30 members of Epiphany took a “Natural Church Development” survey as part of our effort here at Epiphany to take stock of where we are, and provide information to our leaders as we plan for the future. The basic conclusion we can draw from the survey results is that we are a healthy and happy congregation, with a few things to work on.

I'm including with this article a graph that lays out how we scored as a church. As you read it, remember a score of 50 is average, and any score over 65 is in the top 15 percent of all churches in North America. We are clearly an “above-average” church, with four of our scores, in the areas of Gift-based ministry, Passionate Spirituality, Holistic Small Groups, and Loving Relationships, in that top 15 percent category.

I'm glad our results look like that. We have a lot to be thankful for, both to God, and to the many people who over the years have made our church community what it is. At the same time, we are far from perfect. While most of us, for instance, have experienced loving relationships at Epiphany, I am sure some of us have not. The real power of this survey is

What is “Natural Church Development”

In the 1990's a Christian social scientist from Germany named Christian Schwarz asked “what makes church’s grow?” Of course there are lots of books written on this topic. In many of them, formulas and programs that have brought about numerical growth in one church are held up as models. Other Christians strongly believe that only God makes churches grow, but sometimes fall into also believing what we do doesn't matter.

Schwarz thought both of these answers were lacking, so he began a study, initially involving 1,000 churches around the world. Instead of asking “how to grow a church,” he asked questions about each church's health and ministry. What he discovered was that the greatest cause of church growth isn't a great program that worked at another church, or doing nothing except praying, it is simply being and building a healthy church as defined by the Bible. Healthy churches, like healthy plants, grow by themselves. Even more important, healthy churches produce good fruit – healthy Christians. Since that initial study in the 1990's, more than 70,000 churches have participated in the Natural Church Development survey, and benefited from the fair, statistically-normed, snapshot of their health that the survey provides. That number now includes Epiphany.

not so much to tell us we are doing fine, or help us rank ourselves in comparison to other churches, but to give us some direction in the areas we need to grow and work.

This is also very clear from the results. There is in fact only one basic area of ministry that the Natural Church Development survey looks at that we fall below average on as a church community, and that is “Need-Oriented Evangelism” (See the box with this article for a definition of “Need-Oriented Evangelism”).

This is not a big surprise. We have faced some challenges as a church, and as Tom Herrick, the diocese’s canon for church planting who is working with us on this, told our vestry while going over our results, it is easy to turn inward in times like that.

So what happens next? This survey is a first step, a “taking-the-pulse” that will lead into work by the vestry with Tom Herrick at our retreat this January, and also with the congregation. The goal is simply to take what these results show us about Epiphany, and prayerfully ask God how he is looking for us to grow as a church in the years ahead. While I don’t know exactly what this will bring about, I’m excited to have some good information before us about our strengths and those areas where we could be stronger. I invite you to pray with me that the work we do over the next few months will be fruitful as we work to identify the direction and ministries God has for Epiphany over the next few years.

I’m also looking for individuals interested in being part of a planning and visioning committee that will be willing to dive deep into the survey results and work with me, Tom and the vestry in building a concrete plan for our church. What is “Need-Oriented Evangelism?”

Need oriented evangelism is the process by which we intentionally cultivate relationships with people who are not yet Christians so that they can become followers of Jesus themselves who are actively participating in the life of the church and community.

This is not a “pushy” or “manipulative” style of sharing the Gospel. Rather, it is to share the Gospel in a way that meets the questions and needs of those who are not yet Christians. For example, Epiphany’s sports camp, which provides both an introduction to the Gospel, as well as meets our neighborhood’s need for safe summer youth activities, is an example of Need-Oriented Evangelism in action. The Alpha Course, which Epiphany has run in the past, is another example of Need-Oriented Evangelism.




This class will meet on Wednesdays, January 14, 21, 28 and February 4, 2015.



Youth Confirmation

On December 14, 2014 two of Epiphany's teenagers took an important step in their faith by being confirmed. Confirmation is the public commitment of a mature faith by those who were baptized as children in which the bishop formally recognizes them as adult members of the church and prays for them. These boys participated in an 8-week confirmation class in which we covered topics such as the basics of the Christian faith, Anglican history, the Creeds, Anglican worship, the Trinity, and more. In addition to the class these boys read the Gospel of Mark on their own, memorized the Apostles' Creed (which is said in the Confirmation service), and memorized the names of all sixty-six books of the Bible in order. Thomas and Jeffrey did a fantastic job in their preparation work, and it was a privilege to be a part of this significant step in their lives.

As we discussed in the confirmation class, confirmation is not the end of the process; it is the beginning of a life-long commitment to discipleship as well as membership and service in the church. These boys have made a grown-up commitment and are taking on the responsibilities that come with it. Please join in welcoming and congratulating Thomas and Jeffrey.

On January 18, Epiphany and the Missions Committee will welcome Daniel Liberek, who will be preaching at both of our services. 
Currently, 325 STINTers (short term international missionaries) just graduated in May and are scheduled to move overseas at the end of this month. Together, they'll be headed to approximately 76 cities in 35 different countries."



Another missionary Epiphany supports is Maggie McNeely, who grew up at Epiphany and who now works with college students in Newport News, Virginia. Maggie's recent update included the following:

"This past month we've had an emphasis on making sure prayer is a focus in our movement, and it started with Fall Retreat. At the end of September, over 150 students from seven different campuses attended Fall Retreat. We had a speaker come for the weekend, and it was a sweet time getting to know each other and growing in our faith. One of my students said it was like this, 'Fall Retreat was so vital for my relationship with God, I fell back in love with Him and feel renewed.' I just love that. So many other students shared similar thoughts. Thank you for your prayers!!

Another exciting thing that happened this month was I started an inter-sorority bible study for about 7 women. We study the word together and spend time with one another in prayer. I love seeing different sororities come together because their love for Jesus."


