

## Thinking about a Facility Move – What to Expect



This year, we have some facility-related milestones to work through as a congregation. The biggest one is the conclusion of the initial five-year and five-month lease here at 13515 Dulles Technology Drive.

We have a choice to make before our initial lease term ends in early November. Simply put, “is now the time to relocate Epiphany’s facility to a space that would better meet our needs and ministry goals for the long term?” As I said in last month’s newsletter, our basic options are: 1.

Leasing and remodeling another commercial space that is in the right place and is the right size to be our long-term home. 2. Renewing our current lease and remaining in our current location while: (a) saving to purchase land and build a church; or (b) exploring new leasing possibilities as they occur.

In order to choose a direction, this is what we are doing:

1. For the last year, the Joshua Committee (Tom Will - chair, Beth Monroe - vestry liaison, Ian Gross, Andrew Long, Jan Welch, Ross Cummings, and Catherine Zimmerman) have been exploring possibilities. As part of that they surveyed the congregation in October 2016. They then took what the congregation and Epiphany ministry leads told them and worked with a realtor to see what specific options we might have. On January 22, the Joshua committee presented what they learned to the vestry in the form of possible courses of action
2. Over the next month or so, the vestry and finance committee will be considering what the Joshua Committee presented. The questions they will be asking include: “Will any of these options help us better fulfill our emphases as a church,” as well as “do we have the financial and organizational capacity right now to move forward in one of these ways?”
3. If the vestry’s prayerful answer is yes to both of these questions, the next step will be to commend a specific plan of action to the congregation. We hope to then receive feedback from the congregation before the vestry takes a final vote deciding whether or not to move forward this year, ideally before the end of March.

As we move through this process, I am working with the wardens and Epiphany's prayer ministries to make sure we do it prayerfully, that we do it carefully, and that we are able to move forward in unity both as a vestry and as a congregation. While the vestry and finance committee know specifics about what we are considering, I have asked them to keep those details private for now. At this point, all the options we have are "hypotheticals" and as such I think it is important for details to firm up before publicly sharing information that could be misunderstood and probably does not represent the final reality.

My own conviction is that if we say our prayers and think through the options, we will largely agree both as a vestry and then as a congregation on the course to take (or not take). A combination of facts on the ground and our own conversations will make the path clear.

In the meantime, we have been blessed with a functional place to worship and offer ministry here at 13515 Dulles Technology Drive. While the conclusion of our initial lease makes seriously considering our options an appropriate step, I'm grateful for this place and will see you here on Sunday (and other days) until God opens the door to what's next.



## Youth Update


## Newcomer Ministry Leader Needed

### Friends Want to Know About Your Faith



Let that sink in for a minute and see whether it captures your imagination. Do you believe it? Do you think I am making this up?

Actually Lifeway, a Christian research who asked two thousand people, found that more than half of the respondents who don't go to church anymore, attended as a child and are open to attending a church activity. Admittedly, fewer are open to attending a church service but it is not because they are hostile to faith. This means that the fear we might have of broaching a topic on faith and even inviting them to church is unfounded. What this means is that is faith

is important to us, then our friends are open to hearing from us, not feeling being overwhelmed by a religious topic. What I think we have to understand about our unchurched friends is that if we have something authentic to share they will listen. Just as you would listen to them if they share a personal experience, so most of your friends are not as uptight about faith as you might think they are. Sharing is what friends do after all.

Be encouraged, Epiphany, to push back against the idea that there are two things we do not talk about: religion and politics. Actually, right now avoiding politics is probably still a good idea, but I would hope that we would have the boldness to share matters of faith with friends. And we are giving you an opportunity to act on the other issue: people being willing to come to non-worship activities. You may have heard that our contemporary band Cross-Over is doing a concert February 26th at 5pm. We are bringing our best chili recipe and voting on whose is best and we are bringing a canned or dry good to benefit Western Fairfax Christian Ministries. It is not unusual for food pantries to begin to get depleted after the influx at the holidays. We want to make the "cover cost" to be a can of food or two. Once you put all of that together, you have the name Rock 'n' Relief & Chili Cook-off.

## Missions Update: Fran Boyle

*We received an update from Fran Boyle, one of the missionaries Epiphany supports. Fran has toiled for years to improve the lives of children in South Sudan. Here are highlights from Fran's report:*



We are so thankful that the Answering the Call (ATC) team from Pensacola made it safely out of South Sudan with the help of Samaritans Purse. The team was stranded in Juba for five days, as we frantically tried to find a way to fly the team out. The airport and borders were closed after fighting broke out the night of the team's arrival in Juba, on their way out of the country.

The team had a wonderful time of ministry in our compound with the children and in several villages in the area. The team was able to see the progress on the children's dormitory.

Wherever the team went, hundreds of people showed up to hear the team preach. In one place over a thousand people came!

The situation in South Sudan is dire. Fortunately, our children at the orphanage in Akuak Rak have been safe, but there has been sporadic fighting in the region and one town nearby was completely leveled by fighting. Supplies are becoming scarce, and the things that are available are very expensive. It is not safe to travel the roads which may be guarded by one tribe or the other.

We are all sickened by the awful conditions that now dash the hopes of all who had expected much more after the hard fought freedom and independence which was celebrated in 2011. We have several students who will be graduating. They were hoping to go back to Sudan to work for a better future there, but for now that does not seem possible. We hope that we can send them for further training in Kenya until the conditions are such that they can return to South Sudan.

In late January, Scott and Sharon Thompson and I will travel over to minister through healing workshops. These will probably take place in Kenya or Uganda with the refugees pouring over from the most recent fighting.
