## Rector's Sabbatical Notes and Prayer Requests



Epiphany's Rector, the Rev. Peter Frank, will be on Sabbatical from June 1 to September 2. Below is some information about what to expect while Peter is away.

Who is in Charge: During Peter's absence, Epiphany is being led by the team of the associate rector and the wardens. The Rev. Pamela Meeks is the primary spiritual and staff leader, Beth Monroe, the senior warden, leads the vestry, and Mark Oliphant, the junior warden, is in charge of Epiphany's facility. Dennis McNeely, chair of Epiphany's finance committee, is in charge of finances.

What Should I Expect on Sunday: Worship will continue as normal at 8am and 10:15. Mtr. Pamela will be regularly joined by clergy friends of Epiphany, including Epiphany's retired rector, the Rev. Robin Ruah, the Rev. Bob Koth and the Rev. Canon Daryl Fenton. Together, they will be preaching through the Gospel of Mark.

What about the Candle and the Star Newsletters: The Candle email newsletter will continue to be published every week under the leadership of Merle Stromberg. There will be no July issue of the Star Newsletter this summer.

What will Fr. Peter Be Doing During His Sabbatical: On June 7, Fr. Peter will be flying to Athens, Greece, where he will spend a few days of personal vacation before going on to Jerusalem on June 12. While in Jerusalem, Fr. Peter is serving with our Bishop, the Rt. Rev. John Guernsey, as a staff member for the Global Anglican Future Conference which is June 17-22. After returning from Israel, Fr. Peter along with Andrea and Cecilia and Clare, will be traveling to Northern Minnesota where they will be staying and volunteering at Trout Lake Camps. During his time away, Fr. Peter will be focusing on his own spiritual life, reading the books he's been given but hasn't had time to read over his years of ministry at Epiphany, and asking for God's perspective on what is next for our church.

# Missions Update: SAT-7

Among the organizations that Epiphany supports is SAT-7, whose mission is to support the Christians of the Middle East and North Africa in their Christian witness and lives and to deliver Christian satellite television to those locations. The programs that SAT-7 offers not only share the faith but also try to change mindsets in the Middle East. Here is an example:

As well as enabling millions of children to learn in homes and informal refugee settlements, SAT-7 ACADEMY is making a difference in classrooms. The channel will soon be used in two very different educational settings in Lebanon: the Cultural Heritage and Interactive Learning Development (CHILD) Centre for refugees, and a local private school.

"At our centre, we have a refugee student who has an infection in his ears. The father would not take the child to the doctor until the problem became quite serious, endangering the child's hearing," recalls Joanne Farchakh Bajjali, co-founder (with SAT-7) of the Cultural

# Discipleship, Jesus' Essential Method



One of the questions I sometimes ask myself about Jesus' ministry priorities reveals my contemporary bias. Why didn't Jesus rent out Madison Square Garden and hold a rally to gather as many people in one place as possible? Okay I admit I do not make it that specific and contemporary, but you get the point. See, we tend to think in terms of getting the word out to the <u>most people</u> in the shortest period of time. Jesus did indeed gather crowds. We hear about his crowd gathering ability when he fed the five thousand. We also know on a different

occasion that he had so many people around him, we could not even eat (Mark 3:20). But it was Jesus' habit to put more emphasis on discipling the twelve and the slightly larger group of seventy or so. At the same time, Jesus was wary of crowds. "But Jesus on his part did not entrust himself to them, because he knew all people and needed no one to bear witness about man, for he himself knew what was in man" (John 2:24-25).

It is not like Jesus outright ignored the crowds but he knew that they were fickle. Crowds could say "Hosanna" one week and "Crucify him" the next. So, Jesus invested his time and effort into making sure the disciples were getting the essential message straight and he gave them the authority to carry out ministry. In this way, Jesus could ensure that his influence was permanent and lasting, not a superficial flash in the pan. We are grateful for that attention the disciples received. The new ways of thinking and acting within the kingdom could not be entrusted to a few large rallies. Discipleship requires depth and that means time spent in relating heart to heart. A path of discipleship is so much more than a simple prayer to trust Jesus. And it is even more than our education hour, or personal study. Most of us, if we are growing in spiritual depth, have had or still have deep personal relationships that challenge us to wrestle with Scripture on a personal level. Sometimes, these meetings are one-on-one and sometimes, ever so slightly larger. Jesus considered discipleship to be essential, so essential that he modeled it for his trusted followers.

So, I ask you, "Do you have a place to be honest? To ask the hard questions and reveal your heartfelt prayers?" Even if Epiphany does not have a formal way of tracking those in discipling relationships, I would hope that we are a community that nurtures these kind of deep relationships. I can recommend a resource as well. Although I have only just begun to use it, I hear from colleagues that Greg Ogden's <u>Discipleship Essentials</u> is the go-to resource. Even those who are steeped in Scripture will find it helpful as they disciple others in the faith. Let's have a talk if I have stirred up an interest in you. Discipleship is an essential method of Jesus and that is enough to convince me that I want to jump on board too.

Heritage and Interactive Learning Development (CHILD) centre in Lebanon. "It is not uncommon here to see health problems ignored beyond the point where they can be treated."

SAT-7 ACADEMY aims to help people develop coping mechanisms so that small issues do not escalate to larger proportions. Bite-sized SAT-7 ACADEMY segments are being produced to address health issues such as teeth-brushing and other good hygiene habits.

#### COMBATING GENDER INEQUALITY

A man in a refugee settlement in Lebanon told SAT-7 staff that he has four children: three sons and a 14-year-old daughter. He said that he sends his sons to school but does not have the money to educate his daughter.

"The truth is that he is not investing in his daughter's education: firstly because she is a girl, and secondly because a year or two from now she will be married," explains Roy Saab, curriculum developer and SAT-7 ACADEMY consultant. "Girls' education is not a priority for many Middle Eastern families. Bluntly put, the main concern for many parents in the refugee community is that their underage daughters should get married to protect them from rape and so that the father is no longer financially responsible for them."

Sfeir describes a dating program on another Lebanese television channel which features 10 girls who stand in a line as a man chooses which girl he wants to date. "Programs like these minimise the value of women and reinforce the false idea that women are cheap," she says. To tackle these attitudes, SAT-7 ACADEMY addresses issues such as girls' education, early marriage, and women's rights and equality.

#### MAKING A DIFFERENCE "BIT BY BIT"

Making a contribution to improving the social fabric of the MENA is a long-term commitment of SAT-7. As Rita Elmounayer, SAT-7's Deputy CEO and Chief Channels Officer, often says, "bit by bit, we can make a difference." By taking each issue and addressing it in detail, SAT-7 ACADEMY can create small shifts that lead, "bit by bit", to change on a larger scale.
