It seems like this year will be especially busy at Epiphany. We are already in the middle of preparing worship services, planning meals and doing some light touch-up painting in the sanctuary. We have all the clergy of the diocese coming to Epiphany for our annual "Renewal of Ordination Vows" service with Bishop John on Tuesday, April 16, to prepare for as well.

This is not a complaint. Preparing to celebrate this season is the best kind of "busy" there is, and truth be told, I look forward to it every year. But probably the most special part of Holy Week for me isn't a particular service or activity, it is actually the silence, the stillness, between the last Good Friday service and the beginning of the Easter Vigil on Saturday night.

I am not sure why this is. But this is what I think. It's during this time that it is clearest to me that when it comes to our salvation through Jesus Christ, there really is nothing left for us to do. Jesus does it. In a way, he is doing it every Holy Week in that time between our remembrance of his crucifixion on Good Friday and the beginning of our resurrection celebrations as the Sun goes down on Saturday night. He goes down to death, defeats it and rises again, so that we can rise again with him as well.

A few weeks ago, I found an ancient sermon that seems to me to capture this well. It begins this way: *"Something strange is happening. There is a great silence on earth today, a great silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep. The earth trembles and is still..."* This year, I'll be preaching this sermon in its entirety at our Easter Vigil service beginning at 8pm on April 20.

In the midst of your own Holy Week and Easter preparations and worship, my prayer is that you know the Saturday silence as well, and can marvel with me on what it means.

Holy Week and Easter at Epiphany - 2019

Walk the way of the cross and celebrate the resurrection at Church of the Epiphany, April 14-21.

Palm Sunday: Palm Sunday services will be at **8 am and 10:15 am on April 14**. Children will participate in the Palm Sunday procession with the congregation and then attend Sunday School. There is no Sunday School for 3-5th graders. Instead, they are welcome in the Palm Sunday service. Nursery care is provided.

Diocesan Renewal of Vows: Clergy from around the Anglican Diocese of the Mid-Atlantic will gather at Epiphany with our bishop, the Rt. Rev. John Guernsey, to renew their ordination vows and worship together. The worship service, which is open to all, is at 11am on Tuesday, April 16.

Maundy Thursday: We will remember the Last Supper and Jesus' commandment that we "love one another" with a special Passover Seder meal led by the Rev. Canon Daryl Fenton, director of CMJ-USA at 6pm on **Thursday, April 18**. After our meal, we will gather together for a brief communion service and the traditional "stripping of the altar" in preparation for Good Friday.

Good Friday: This solemn service is at **noon and 7:30 pm on Friday, April 19**.

Great Vigil of Easter: Epiphany begins our Easter celebrations with the Great Vigil of Easter service at **8 pm on Saturday, April 20**. As part of this service, Epiphany's clergy preach an ancient Christian Holy Saturday. This musical and traditional service tells the story of salvation and joyfully welcomes the beginning of the Easter season.

Easter Sunday: Easter worship at Epiphany is at **10:15 am on April 21**. Join us for this glorious and joyful service. There is no 8 am service on Easter Sunday.

A note about daily services during Holy Week. Epiphany's daily **worship** services will continue on a limited schedule during Holy Week. There will not be a Morning Prayer service on Tuesday or Friday.



Being with God



Missions Update: Global Scholars

Among the organizations supported by Epiphany is Global Scholars. Here are excerpts from recent reports describing its activities:

During the 2017-18 academic year Global Scholars professors called 42 countries “home.” In the past six months we have sent professors to four new countries: Colombia, Finland, Israel, and Pakistan. The academic disciplines they are teaching in are diverse as well: business administration, political science, soil science, and biblical studies.

We are moving on to 2019. But first I want to share a simple story from last semester. It illustrates how Global Scholars professors are accomplishing our purpose. It shows how they are having a redemptive influence among their students, colleagues, universities, and academic disciplines.



In Eastern Europe, “Ben” is a Global Scholars professor who recently finished teaching a survey course in the Old Testament. His students had almost no exposure to the Bible prior to his course. Students maintained a respectful silence during the lectures but Ben wanted feedback. He assigned reflection papers that encouraged them to **share their impressions of the Scriptures**. Ben provided prompts that allowed students to share a more personal side that is often hidden. Questions were, “What did you expect coming into the course?” “Why do you think the Bible is considered sacred or

holy by so many?” and “If you could go back to the beginning of the semester, what would you tell yourself about the course?”

*Most had very negative attitudes toward the Bible and religion coming into the course. Nearly all had zero biblical literacy. Most said they were Christian. Nearly all were shocked by the contents of the Bible. **A handful said that the Bible has impacted their perspective and are considering the implications for their lives.** Many said the Bible wasn't their **choice of truth** but enjoyed the class, anyway. Keep in mind we only read through the Old Testament. Very strange! The combination of this class and its audience proves it to be a difficult class to teach, but God moves, and so many shared such positive remarks. So many enjoyed our 45 hours together and loved (observing mostly) the classroom discussion despite their hesitance to speak.*



There is a final observation from this story. Despite doing an excellent job, many Global Scholars professors wonder if their service in the classroom, research, or administration is making a difference. Ben admitted, “I was under the impression this semester was not that im-

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pactful, but as always, God enjoys the mystery.” This is a reminder of how important it is to continue in prayer and financial partnership for our professors. We want to keep them in universities as unparalleled influencers of tomorrow’s leaders.

The 46 nations where Global Scholars professors now teach is more than double the number of countries we taught in a decade ago. However, it is still short of the 196-nation total on our “shrinking” globe. **We rejoice that Global Scholars professors are serving in 46 nations. Yet how will we reach students in the remaining 149 countries?**

We have been working on an answer to this question for several years now, in order to move closer to our ultimate vision that *one day every university student in the world will have a Christian professor who can help them live and lead as Christ’s followers in their nations.*
