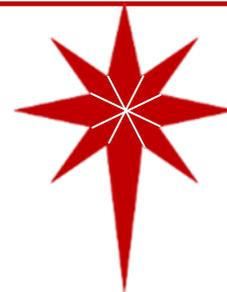

I don’t have a lot of memories from the last time nuclear concerns were relevant in the mid-1980’s. Though, at one point I recall sending a request for information off to the Soviet Embassy for a school project. I received a nice packet of brochures in English from them that helpfully explained the nuclear tensions were all America’s fault (some things don’t seem to change).

So how do we face the fears we may have in times like these? I was reminded recently that Jesus has a clear command for us. “Be Not Afraid!” I particularly love how Jesus says it in John 14, verse 27. *“Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you... Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid.”*

The key thing about Jesus’ word to us is this. We have been given His peace, that is peace with God. Because we have that, we can know for sure that whatever happens to us, we will not be cut off from God. Along with that, we can count on His presence with us no matter where we are and what is going on.

Now, that said, do I hope and pray that the war in Ukraine ends and Russia’s leaders recognize that threatening the United States and much of the rest of the world with missiles and bombs isn’t useful in the end? I do.

At the same time, I plan to do my best to take Jesus’ words as words for me, *“be not afraid!”*

Where Can We Find Wisdom?

Most of us desire to make wise choices, to have a sense of direction and purpose in a life that is in step with God's bigger purposes. Even when we recognize that wisdom comes from God, we know that we still need discernment when we recognize that we have presuppositions that might lead us astray. Let me explain through an illustration I happened upon recently.



Let's say you are a train enthusiast so you go to Metro Center in DC to watch the constant movements of the many trains passing through. You can see a lot going on from close up but there is also a lot you don't see. You will only be able to form a very rough and general idea of what is going on. On the other hand, let's pretend that you are privileged enough to be taken into the inner workings of the control center. You



could see where every train is, where they are going and how they do not crash into each other! You could see the whole situation through the eyes of those controlling it. The whys and wherefores of all these movements become plain once you can see the overall big picture.

Now, sometimes we may suppose that when God gives us wisdom, that we are given a deeper insight into the providential meaning and purpose of events going on around us. We guess that God's gift of wisdom is an ability to see why things are the way they are and what will happen next. We presume that once we are allowed into the upper tier of knowledge, like the control center of the train system, that we would be able to discern the real purpose of everything that happens. Life would all be clear about God's deep purposes.

But wisdom does not often work like that for us. Not that it never happens, mind you, just not often. As much as we might want to be invited into the control room, enjoying inside information directly from God is actually not necessary for us to live faithful Christian lives.

This is where humility and obedience come in. Not until we have become humble and teachable, standing in awe of God's holiness and sovereignty are we able to benefit from any wisdom that God may give us. We are called to trust God without knowing very much. Leave to God, the issues of the day by letting the Lord measure its ultimate worth. Your part is to use good sense and enterprise at your command in taking the opportunities that lie before you. That is the essence of letting go that we get from **Ecclesiastes 11:6** *"In the morning sow your seed, and at evening withhold not your hand, for you do not know which will prosper, this or that, or whether both alike will be good."*

Pittsburgh Bishop Election is April 30

Epiphany's rector, the Rev. Peter Frank, is one of three candidates on the ballot when the Anglican Diocese of Pittsburgh gathers to elect its next bishop on April 30.

The election will be held at St. Stephen's Anglican Church in Sewickley, PA. Lay delegates and clergy from each of the Diocese of Pittsburgh's 49 congregations will vote. The first candidate to receive a majority of votes from both the clergy and lay orders will become the bishop-elect. The election will then need to be confirmed by the Anglican Church in North America's College of Bishops on June 13.

Fr. Peter will communicate election results to Epiphany via email on April 30. If Fr. Peter is elected, he hopes to remain at Epiphany into the summer with the goal of transitioning to Pittsburgh by early August. If not elected, Fr. Peter plans to happily continue serving as Epiphany's rector.

Holy Week and Easter at Epiphany - 2022

Walk the way of the cross and celebrate the resurrection at Church of the Epiphany, April 10-17

Palm Sunday: Palm Sunday services will be at **8:30 am and 10:15 am on April 10**. Children will participate in the Palm Sunday procession with the congregation and then attend Sunday School. There is no Sunday School for 3-5th graders. Instead, they are welcome in the Palm Sunday service.

Renewal of Vows: Diocesan clergy will be meeting at Epiphany to renew their ordination vows with Bishop John at 10:30am on Tuesday, April 12.

Maundy Thursday: We will remember the Last Supper and Jesus' commandment that we "love one another" with communion at **7pm on Thursday, April 14**.

Good Friday: This solemn service is at **noon and 7 pm on Friday, April 15**.

Prayer Vigil: Epiphany will be keeping a prayer vigil in the chapel beginning at the conclusion of the evening Good Friday service through to the start of the Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday evening. Great Vigil of Easter: Epiphany begins our Easter celebrations with the Great Vigil of Easter service at **7:45 pm on Saturday, April 16**. As part of this service, Epiphany's clergy preach an ancient Christian Easter sermon that was originally delivered in Constantinople during the 4th century. This musical and traditional service tells the story of salvation and joyfully welcomes the beginning of the Easter season.

Easter Sunday: Easter worship at Epiphany is at **10:15 am on April 17**. Join us for this glorious and joyful service. There is no 8 am service on Easter Sunday.

A note about daily services during Holy Week. Epiphany's daily worship services will continue on a limited schedule during Holy Week. There will not be a Morning Prayer service on Tuesday (Clergy attending renewal of vows) or Friday.

To that end, here is a brief description of what we are looking for:


***Church of the Epiphany Anglican in Chantilly

“Thank you so much for your generous (sic) donation of our yearbooks. I have been asking for a yearbook from my mom but she always said no.”


“From you buying me a yearbook, I now have memories. Thank you for wasting your money on me who you don’t even know!”

Missions Update: Andy Fetzer

Andy Fetzer preached to us last fall, regaling us with stories about his Young Life ministry in southwest Virginia. Here is a newspaper account of a recent Young Life event in Roanoke Valley:

Over 300 Roanoke Valley teenagers attended last week's Young Life Dodgeball Tournament.

How do you get over 300 teenagers to sit quietly? Teach them a little bit about the love of God in Jesus and then let them wail away on each other with small red rubber balls for a few hours.

That's just what happened at the 6th annual Young Life Dodge Ball tournament held earlier this week where 36 teams (24 boy / 12 girl) from High Schools all across the Roanoke Valley competed for a trophy and "Valley Champion" status for a year.



The winning boys team was from North Cross, "Team North Cross Two" (there wasn't a North Cross One; don't ask). The winning girls team was from Cave Spring, "Team Kendall" (named in honor of Kendall Bayne and her fight with cancer).

Teams also had to come with a costume and there was an award for the best uniform.

After all teams had completed their first two matches, play was stopped and everyone gathered on the court. Josh Goodman, a Young Life leader at Patrick Henry High School spoke for about 5 minutes on "What is Young Life?"

"Young Life is about fun, friendships and a person," said Goodman. "We like to have a lot of fun... We meet people who become lifelong friends in Young Life... and we talk about Jesus. We think he's what life is about. So, in a non-threatening environment, we challenge kids to take a closer look at Jesus, no pressure. We're convinced he holds the key to living life to the full and with real purpose and meaning. And we believe kids have a right to hear who they are and whose they are. And the neat thing about YL is, kids can take or leave it. Young Life leaders still show up and think the world of them... We don't stop running after kids based on their opinions about Jesus..."

After the informational talk the games resumed and everyone enjoyed watching one another get pelted in the head with dodge balls.

Young Life has been around for over 70 years and is in every state and in about 80 countries. The group was started in Texas in 1941 by a youth pastor named Jim Rayburn who wondered
